

THE GIRL PLAYED MAN 5 YEARS

Mrs. Elena B. Smith Met Only Two Model Human Males in All Her Years Chumming With Them—Good Young Men and Good Husbands Who Are Traitors to Sacred Secrets of the Home—Wickedness of a City.

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—"Oh, what I know about you!" is the general attitude of Mrs. Elena B. Smith, toward menfolk in general. And what Mrs. Smith knows has given her a very poor opinion of the sex.

For five years Mrs. Smith, who is 26 now, masqueraded as a man. As Albert C. Martinez, a young South American, she held jobs successively as bookkeeper, Spanish correspondent, real estate solicitor and salesman for a number of well known New York firms.

During that time she remarkably deceived hundreds of business and social acquaintances—all of them men. In fact, the persons surprised most when her remarkable story was made public were the very men who had employed her and the young fellows she chummed with who knew her as "Al" or "Kid" Martinez.

She began her strange adventure, she says, five years ago when a Boston doctor made a wager that he could find a woman who could pass as a man for one year. He selected Mrs. Smith, a tall, rather slender, soft-voiced, suave, young woman who had spent some years in South America and could speak Spanish.

"During her five years as 'Martinez' she mingled with a company of gay youths who had Broadway for their evening playground.

Mrs. Smith took up the challenge partly for the adventure, partly for the winner's end of the best—\$2500—offered her if she succeeded, partly because she had a very definite notion that men and women do not compete on equal terms in business.

At the end of a year she had escaped detection, but complications had arisen to prevent her assuming her proper role as a woman. A young woman who had been living with 'Martinez' as his wife had parents in Boston to whom the masquerader had been introduced as 'husband.' 'Martinez' was successful in business, earning a better salary than Mrs. Smith could.

So the pretender continued to be a 'man,' even carrying out her deception to the point of letting her hair shave her. Recently she started up in business for herself. As there was no longer any need for the masquerade she let her hair grow, moved her office and reappeared as Mrs. Smith.
