NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—The New York Times, under Beverly (Mass.) date, says today: "The president has been aware for some time that Roosevelt has not been disposed to be politically friendly. Accordingly, Roosevelt's Osawatimie speech was not a surprise. "An incident of Col. Cecl Lyon's visit to Oyster Bay was brought to Beverly recently. Colonel Lyon, republican boss of Texas, is represented as having said that he and his Texans were ready to do anything Colonel Roosevelt might ask, with home exception. That, as the story ran, was to send a Taft delegation to the next national convention.

"Give yourself no worry, my dear Cecl, on that score," Colonel Roosevelt is reported to have replied. "I am not only disappointed with the Taft administration; I am disgusted."

Did Williams Beat Kelly's Spokane Record?



NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—A hundred yards in nine seconds flat! This is the feat timers and witnesses say Richard Perry Williams, physical director and coach of the Berkeley school, New York, accomplished at New Lyme, Mass., late in August. A hundred yards in nine seconds! If Williams actually sprinted the distance in that time he reached a goal which clenched fists, pounding hearts, bursting lungs, spring steel muscles and iron determinations have struggled for in vain since the days of the Greeks. Williams clipped three-fifths of a second off the official A. A. U. 100 yard sprint record made by Dan J. Kelly at Spokane, Wash., June 23, 1906. Three-fifths of a second! What is that? The quiver of an eyelash, the twinkling of a star, a heartbeat, the flutter of a bird's wing. But it's a great deal. Let Williams and Kelly race 100 yards, each running the distance in his own best time. Kelly in 9.85 seconds, Williams in 9 flat. Both runners leap into the air at the crack of the pistol. They come down the stretch blurred by their speed. But Williams breaks the tape when Kelly has still 18 feet 9 inches to go—half the width of a city lot. That's what a heart beat, three-fifths of a second, is in the 100 yard dash. Williams had to cross 23 feet 4 inches each time a watch's second had moved. Williams made the record in the presence of a small gallery of Pine Grove, Mass., summer residents on the track at the state camp grounds. Two men with stop watches caught the time at nine seconds flat. The watches agreed. The track is level and straight. No wind was blowing. The A. A. U. will not accept the record, made unofficially as it was. Later, at some of the authorized meets, Williams will be given the opportunity to run an official 100 yards. He is confident of making the official record, for he claims to have run the hundred in 9.15 several times in practice. Williams claims to have lowered other sprinting and jumping records in unofficial trials. He is 26 years old, 5 feet 10 1/2 inches tall, weighs 165 pounds. This summer he was physical director of the New London vacation schools.

IRON MAN "WALKS" TO WORK AND BACK

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—Charles Guest Norris, an English engineer, is over here with a new "iron man" which he has invented. He calls it an "iron man" because it can "walk." It is said to be a great invention, but aside from walking, it has no resemblance to a man. It will walk around the corner with a dozen tons of tools and machinery. It has four legs, and will walk in water as well as on ground. When stationary, the back forms a level platform from which work may be done. The "walking" is accomplished by two frameworks, one within the other, each having four legs. One frame slide forward and the legs are lowered. Then the legs of the other frame are lifted up and that other frame, or platform, slides forward and the legs rest again on the ground. And so, ad infinitum.
