A STANDPAT SCHEME HERE

There is nothing in the primary law that prevents a citizen from writing or pasting the name of any person that he might desire to vote for, whose name does not appear on the ballot, over that of another candidate on the ballot whom he does not want to support.

It is under this section of the law that the standpatters propose, in a great many cases, to write in the name of a second choice for congressman rather than support one of the progressives.

For congressman the voter must vote for first and second choice to have his ballot count for that office. He cannot vote for the same man twice, but must cast his first and second choice for different men.
