HOT LOCAL FIGHTS BETWEEN RING AND COUNTY INSURGENTS

At noon today the unofficial primary election returns for Spokane county were coming in slowly at the auditor's office. It will not be until toward evening that the result in some of the close legislative contests can be determined. Miles Poindexter has carried Spokane county in the senatorial fight by a vote of 5 to 1. LaFollette has swept the county for congress, with a big lead over his next nearest opponent. S. A. Mann and Seabury Merritt are in a close race for next highest in the congressional battle. Braden is close behind Mann and Merritt, with Veatch at the tail end.

Chancellor George W. Shaefer has defeated Ed Sanders in the Sixth legislative district and Harry Rossaupt has downed McArthur in the seventh district. In the Second legislative district W. E. Stephens has a good lead and is nominated along with R. E. Buchanan. Book and Wheaton are running a few hundred votes behind Stephens. In the Third district George L. Deaman is renominated, with Will Coates and Elmer E. Hall close for the second position.

EXPLOSION OF A GAS POCKET

(By United Press Leased Wire) LINTON, Ind., Sept. 14.—One man was killed, one fatally and ten seriously injured today by an explosion of a gas pocket in the Dugger coal mine in Sullivan county. More than 200 miners were in the tunnels when the explosion occurred. It was at first believed that all were entombed and little hope was entertained that they would escape alive. The men were working in a distant tunnel, to which fact they probably owe their lives. The killed and injured were returning toward the shaft when the accident occurred. When the news of the explosion spread through the mining community, the families of the men below ground rushed to the main entrance. Many women were hysterical and some of the pitiful scenes of the Cherry mine disaster were re-enacted.
