HUMPHREY RE-NOMINATED BY CLOSE MARGIN

But Will Face Hard Fight for Election in November.

SEATTLE, Wn., Sept. 15.—Returns at hand indicate that Congressman W. E. Humphrey, a standard-bearer, has been re-nominated by a very narrow margin on the first choice vote. While the figures at hand do not give him quite enough first choice votes to make 40 per cent, the number necessary to nominate, it is probable that the missing returns, being from counties and precincts favorable to him, will pull him through. If nominated Humphrey will face a hard fight at the election in November.

'DEATH TO UNIONISM IN WESTERN AMERICA'

Group of Men, Representing the "Interests," Have Started War on Pacific Coast, Having for Their Object, Unrestricted Employment of Hindus, Japs, Mexicans and European Immigrants.

BY DANA SLEETH. ARTICLE I. Spokane, Portland, Seattle, Los Angeles, Tacoma, Vancouver and Victoria for months have been under the control of the small group of men who represent the big business interests of the United States, none of them interested directly in any city, none of them residing nearer the Pacific coast than 2,000 miles.

The laws of these cities, the police program of these cities, the rights of the majority of the residents of these cities and the prosperity of the entire coast have all been directly under the thumbs of this group of men.

And these men have gone to work definitely to embroil the entire Pacific coast in the greatest war of its history. These men have, by spending hundreds of thousands of dollars, lost millions to the business interests of the coast. These men, by a shrewd scheme, have turned tens of thousands of workers against hundreds of employers and have set back 10 years the hoped-for time of arbitration and industrial peace.

These dozen men control the railroads and timber interests and the big manufacturing monopolies of the nation. They also, for private profit, control the National Manufacturers' association. These men, through their association, have brought on a coast-wide war that has for its avowed object the death of unionism in western America.

FOOTBALL SQUAD ROUNDING OUT


