BOWLING RECORDS SMASHED

City bowling records went all to smash last night when the Smith Dope and Great American Laundry teams rolled three match games on the Pfister alleys, and the ladies, blue team, were responsible for it.

The Smith Dopes held, until last night, the record for the highest number of pins rolled in a match, and figured themselves sure winners, but the girls of the American laundry turned out in force and rooted for their representatives, until under the feminine incentive the Great Americans rolled up a total score of 2859 pins, which is the league record. They also shattered all city records for a single game when they rolled 999 pins in the first game. A. L. Jenkins of the laundrymen took a hand in the record breaking when he rolled a single game of 264 pins and a total score of 704 pins, both of which are liable to stand for some time to come.

The Smith Dopes did some good bowling, but only rolled up a score of 2677 pins for the three games.



PRESS' SERIES OF FOOTBALL LESSONS FOR BOY TEAMS

Boys, have you organized your football team, and if not, are you going to organize one?

What about a coach? There must be plenty of boy teams in this city which are not fortunate enough to have the services of a coach, and for their benefit The Press has arranged for publication of a series of illustrated football lessons. These lessons will consist of diagrams, together with printed instructions for working the play as diagrammed. If you study the diagrams carefully and follow the directions, you will have no trouble in working out the plays. The first play is called the



The split buck from regular formation: This famous college play is easy to understand, and it will be widely used this fall. It is well to spring it after a series of skin tackle plays, and may be used on both sides of the line. If it is well timed, it is a sure ground gainer. Try it and see what you think of it.

If skin tackle plays are working, get them going fast, then slip this in. Start the fullback and left half on what looks like a tackle buck, have the right half delay, make a fake pass to the left half, and then pass it to the right half, who cross-bucks through the left side after the half and full have passed.

A. C. Anson: "The Cubs lacked the ginger and the usual snap they have always displayed. Perhaps the opening defeat had this effect on Chance's men. But for perfect support Coombs probably would have lost his game."

Ty Cobb: "Truly the Athletics showed great offensive strength. Mordcaj Brown was not up to expectations."

George Mullin: "The Cubs were outplayed in every department. I cannot conceive how the Cubs have any possible hope for ultimate victory."

Joe Tinker: "Everything was breaking for them and against us."

Bill Lange: "The Cubs were out-lucked, but they must show more in order to win."

What Will They Do Tomorrow?

With the Athletics now two to the good in the world series, and no game scheduled for today, local interest now centers on the question of whether the Cubs will be able to make any better showing on their home lot.

Tomorrow's game, which will be played in Chicago, should by the general rule of baseball, go to the Cubs, for it ordinarily happens that the home team plays a better game upon its own grounds. Then, too, the Athletics will be entirely new to the grounds, and before a rabid crowd of Cub rooters, the younger players of the Mack team are extremely likely to feel some little nervousness.

If the Cubs cannot win tomorrow there will be no further chance for them to get the pennant, as there is not a chance in the world that they could get away with four straight games after the showing the Athletics have made already.

In Spokane today even money is being offered that the Cubs win tomorrow's game, while 2 to 1 is asked on the bet that the Cubs take the series. A bet of \$25 to \$100 was made last night that the Cubs would not get a game, the Athletics making it four straight.

Spokane Team Is Crippled, but Game

Spokane High football team is not showing up in the shape that might be desired for the game with Broadway next Saturday, and Coach Kennedy has begun looking dubious when he speaks of the coming contest.

Several members of the team are troubled with Charley-horse, and among the list are Adams, Peddicord, Shiel and Seagraves, four of the most valuable men on the team. Hard practice will be held every night this week, but unless these men can get in shape it will be necessary to send a patched line-up against the strong visiting team, and chances for success in such an event are not particularly bright.

The students who have charge of the game, however, are looking on the bright side of things, and feel themselves much encouraged by the manner in which the people of Spokane are rallying to the support of the team. The student body also feels confident that there are enough strong players in the second team to fill any vacancies which may occur on the regular line-up and to fill them in such a manner that the absence of the regular will be little missed.
