


AN INSURRECTION IN PHILIPPINES

United Press Leased Wire. MANILA, Oct. 31.—One of the greatest insurrections since the pacification of the Philippines is being today in southern Mindanao. The Monobos are reported to have devastated several coast villages, sacked many hamlets and slaughtered the inhabitants. Brigadier General Pershing is en route with 1,000 United States troops and 500 scouts and constabulary.
