FRANTIC EFFORT TO RESCUE MEN

(By United Press Leased Wire.) BLACK DIAMOND, Wash., Nov. 8.—Spurred by the hope that five of the missing men imprisoned in the Lawson mine at Black Diamond may yet live, two searching parties are working from either end of the underground death trap with feverish haste.

It is the theory of the searchers that the five men who were on their way to the surface at the time of the explosion lie entrapped. If not overcome by the deadly damp and experienced miners say they may be alive. In that event it is possible that another 48 hours may reveal their fate.

General Manager James Anderson says the mine will be reopened if the expense does not exceed \$100,000. If the expense exceeds that figure the Lawson mine will be abandoned, a blackened monument to underground disaster.





NOTED FENIAN IS NEAR DEATH

MUSKOGEE, Okla., Nov. 8.—Rossa, once the most picturesque of the Fenians of Ireland, is close to death at his home in New Brighton, S. I. He is almost 80 years old, but is yet, despite his feeble physical condition, as staunch an advocate of Irish freedom as in the days long past, when he was one of the most active of the members of the Irish revolutionary party.

Rossa was born in the county Cork and when barely out of his boyhood days was sent to jail because of his revolutionary beliefs. After that he worked for Ireland's independence between terms in the jail.

In 1871 he was banished from the British possessions and until the edict of banishment was raised in 1891 conducted his revolutionary campaign from New York. When free to return to Ireland he was made clerk of the council of county Cork, but the new Irish party built up by Parnell was not revolutionary enough to suit to hot headed Fenians, so Rossa came back to America, where he spent his time in literary pursuits.

WILL DISMANTLE HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING FOR \$7425

A contract was let to A. Valke last evening for the dismantling of the walls of the burned South Central high school building. His bid was \$7425. In case he does not qualify, the work will go to A. Cheatham, who was the next lowest bidder, his price being \$7700. The highest bid was that of the Spokane Wrecking company, which placed a figure of \$10,482 on the work.

The Northern Pacific is rushing with all possible speed the work of double-tracking between Spokane and Wins, five miles west. The cost of the work will be about \$250,000. The work is expected to be finished by the latter part of the month and the Northern Pacific will then have a feasible track from Spokane to Marshall Junction, which will add materially to the service and safety of the road.

FREIGHT TRAIN HELD UP BY FIRE ENGINES

An N. P. freight train held up the hook and ladder wagon of the fire department so long at the Howard street crossing yesterday noon that the driver was forced to go around by way of the Washington street viaduct to arrive at the scene of the alarm.

Chief Myers' auto and the two auto hose cars dashed up Howard street and just barely succeeded in getting across the track in front of the advancing engine. They signalled furiously to the engineer to stop his train till the hook and ladder wagon could get across, but no attention was paid to them.

LIVED TOGETHER ONLY EIGHT DAYS.

MODERN PORTIA TO PROSECUTE FATHER, AGED 90, FOR BIGAMY

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—O'Donovan Aged and bent by the burden of four score and ten years, William Sperry, or William A. Pound, is under arrest at Tulsa after having been literally trailed to earth by his own daughter and the daughter of the woman he deserted in Kansas City, Kan., 31 years ago.

Father and daughter met here last night and the old man was placed under arrest upon her complaint. He is charged with bigamy. His daughter, a law student in Washington, graduates in a short time and declared she will prosecute the case.

According to the story of Mrs. Margaret Morrell, the prisoner's daughter, when she was one of four small children, her father ran away with a servant of the family. The woman with whom he went away died. He married again. Fifteen years ago Sperry came to Tulsa. He changed his name to William Pound. He has two children by his last marriage.

In 1900 Margaret Hopkins Sperry, now Mrs. Margaret Morrell, an employe in the department of commerce and labor at Washington, interested friendly representatives in a special bill allowing her mother a pension. Sperry is a civil war veteran. The bill passed.

Two years ago anonymous letters were written to the pension department stating that Mrs. Sperry's

husband was living and that under such circumstances she was not entitled to the pension. The department started an investigation which revealed the whereabouts of Sperry and the woman's pension of \$15 per month was cut off.

"The man that wrote was father himself, although he never gave his name," said Mrs. Morrell. "I have a copy of all his letters to the pension department. He did not know that the little girl whom he left in their farmhouse years ago was now an attorney able to defend her mother and prosecute her mother."

"If father had ever sent one penny to his hungry wife and children I would spare him. But he even got their pension taken away. I can have no mercy on him."

JUST MARRIED MAN CHARGED WITH MURDER

EVERETT, Wash., Nov. 8.—Charles Kirk, owner of a saloon at Monroe, is locked up in the county jail today charged with murder, while his bride of three days is raving in hysteria in the new home of the young couple, where Kirk was torn from his bride's arms last night.

Kirk is charged with the murder of Charles Montross. Montross was a shingle weaver, 32 years old. He had been attending a public dance, and left the hall shortly after midnight yesterday morning. A few minutes later a shot was heard and Montross staggered, crying that he was shot. He died in a few minutes. Montross has a wife in the east. His parents live at Snohomish.
