You can use moral suasion, certainly, but if that husband of yours refuses to be intimidated, you are strictly up against it in the voting line. Now isn't that mean? Yes, it is.

Your husband can renounce his allegiance to Uncle Sam in order to prevent you from voting for a man, but it is rather a cumbersome method of procedure and is not very likely to be popular among the masters of the home. It is a severe blow, women of Washington, but it will be remedied, no doubt. Until it is, your spouse has a power over you that, while not likely to be used, is effective in that it has spoiled your fondest dreams of political equality. (By United Press Leased Wire.) TOLEDO, Ohio, Nov. 17.—The standing army of the United States is inadequate, according to Major General Frederick D. Grant, who is in Toledo today. Grant declared emphatically that the regular force is too small to meet any contingency that might arise.

"We should have 250,000 men in training at all times," he said.

General Grant does not believe that the recent disturbances on the Mexican border will have any lasting results. There is no chance, he said, of serious differences between Mexico and the United States.
