JOHNSTONE FALLS 200 FEET; DEAD

(By United Press Leased Wire.) DENVER, COLO., NOV. 17.—RALPH JOHNSTONE, ONE OF THE WRIGHT AVIATORS, WAS KILLED THIS AFTERNOON AT 4:30 BY A FALL FROM HIS BIPLANE AT OVERLAND PARK. HIS AEROPLANE OVERTURNED AND THE BIRDMAN DROPPED AT A HEIGHT OF 200 FEET.

SUPERIORS STAND BY SULLIVAN


REAL "GRAY WOLVES" SQUIRM UNDER LASH OF POLICE EXPOSURE

[Editorial Note.—The morning newspaper defender of a corrupt police system today printed a cartoon that showed the legs and feet of Sullivan, with the "gray wolves" spoken of by Mayor Pratt circling around. One of the wolves is labeled "yellow journal," which probably means The Press, the newspaper that exposed the rotten conditions in the police department.

Mayor Pratt was elected on a platform promising a reform administration. Instead his incumbency of the office has been marked by more incompetence, inefficiency, waste of the public funds and corruption than has ever marked a preceding administration in nearly a score of years.

BRADLEY IS NEXT ON THE RACK

Officer, Suspended by Chief Doust, Must Face Trial.

Tomorrow morning at 9:30 George Bradley, one of the younger policemen on the city force, will be called to trial on a charge of conduct unbecoming an officer, preferred by Chief Doust.

THE BEN HOWARD CASE.

Bradley was suspended on the 14th inst. when the charge against him was first reported. Bradley is the man who last spring clubbed Ben Howard, colored, proprietor of the Pekin bar on Front avenue, when Howard asked for permission to wash his hands before accompanying Bradley to the police station.

SULLIVAN REFUSED TO ACT.

The next day Howard reported the assault to Chief Sullivan and demanded that he take steps against Bradley, but Sullivan refused to act.

Railway Men Confess Wreck of Machinery

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 17.—Sworn confessions that they maliciously destroyed machinery at the instigation of high officials of the local machinists' union, were issued today by P. E. Sweeney and W. G. Owens, former employees of the Missouri Pacific railroad in its shops at Sedalia, Mo.

According to their confessions they placed steel filings and emery dust in the bearings of locomotives and other machinery at the instigation of leaders of striking machinists. The authorities are withholding the names of the alleged instigators.

CARS, ENGINE PASSENGERS AND ALL TAKEN

(By United Press Leased Wire.) MONTESANO, Wn., Nov. 17.—Robert Stabbs, a youth of 17 years, is in jail here today charged with having attempted to steal a passenger train, passengers, cars and all.

When Northern Pacific train No. 322 pulled into the station last night Stabbs jumped aboard the engine while the fireman and engineer were underneath it inspecting a leaking valve.
