NO SCRAP YET FOR "BAT AND AD"

 CADILLAC, Mich., Nov. 17.—Tom Jones, manager of Ad. Wolgast, champion lightweight, declared today that it was he and not Wolgast who made arrangements for the Nelson-Wolgast fight in San Francisco in December, contrary to the report that Promoter Louis Biot had dealt with Wolgast direct. Jones refused to admit that Wolgast had "run out" of the match.

"I never agreed upon any exact date," said Jones today. "I told Nelson he could have the first chance and that spring would suit us. That still goes for us. Wolgast's arm will be mended by then. If there was any fixed agreement to fight on December 24, we did not know of it, and as I did all the negotiating, I ought to be aware of it. It's out of the question to expect Wolgast to fight before March or April. Why, his arm is still in a plaster cast."

The Broadview Dairy team took three straight games from the Interstate Rubber company bowlers in the Commercial league last night, finishing with a score of 243 to 2197.


On the Pfister alleys last night the Metropoles walloped the John W. Graham quintet for three straight games, the total score being 2232 to 2135.

NELSON NOT ELIGIBLE
