

JOHNSTONE MUCH TO DARING

(By United Press Leased Wire)

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—Mrs. Ralph Johnstone, widow of the aviator killed at Denver yesterday afternoon, started for Kansas City today to attend the funeral of her husband. Before leaving she said that Johnstone's ambition was to attain an altitude of 10,000, and that he had hoped to establish records at Denver. Johnstone made his first aeroplane flight last May. Wilbur Wright was greatly moved as he discussed Johnstone's death. "Ralph was a fine fellow," he said, "clean cut, honest and straightforward. His only weakness was that he would not permit anyone to beat him; he was dissatisfied with equalling another's achievements—he wanted to excel. When Johnstone and Hoxsey started for Denver I lectured them good, and they promised not to take any foolish risks."

"One trouble with Ralph was that he would not keep within the limits of safety. Instead of making a turn in ten seconds, which would be safe, he would make it in five, thus risking his neck."

"The boys, especially Ralph, are not sufficiently experienced to realize that they must keep on the safe side. Ralph was the quickest pupil he had, but he took too many chances and many times my heart was in my mouth while watching him."

SHE'S A WONDER IN THE SADDLE, IS CHAMPION COWGIRL BRONCO BUSTER

PENDLETON, Ore., Nov. 13.—Miss Florence Adams is the champion cowgirl of the northwest. She won her title officially at the "Round Up," a wild west show which is given annually at Pendle-

ton and in which all the best known cattle country luminaries participate. At the round-up this autumn Miss Adams easily won the cowgirl's pony race. She was not sat-

isfied with the honor of being the northwest's champion woman rider.

As a result she rode a wild horse that had previously thrown several professional cowboys. The animal bucked for 15 minutes and then decided that he was beaten. By breaking the untamed brute, Miss Adams won her title of champion woman "broncho buster."

It is not probable that her title will be challenged for some time as there are few women, even in the western cattle country, who care to essay a ride on the hurricane deck of a wild range horse. The average citizen forms a mental picture of a cowgirl or cowboy as a person dressed in a wide brimmed hat, a six-shooter on the hip, buckskin chaps or skirts and a general daredevil expression, mixed in with plenty of nerve. Miss Adams has neither the buckskin skirt nor the six-shooter and dresses as does the average woman out for a morning or evening canter.
