BOOK WANTS TO UNPACK HEART (By United Press Leased Wire) NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—That Dr. Cook felt he was in the position of the "man without a country," and that he wanted to unbosom himself to the American people and be taken back after having earned their respect, is the statement of Henry Mack, former attorney for the explorer. Mack talked with Cook in London during August. MARKET STRONGER (By United Press Leased Wire) NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—The reduction of the discount rate by the Bank of England and the disposition to maintain steel prices had a strengthening effect on today's stocks. Notable losses were Denver and Rio Grande preferred, 4; Missouri Pacific, 1 3/4; Union Pacific, 1 3/8; Southern Pacific, 1 1/4; Illinois Central, 1 1/2, and Northern Pacific, Reading, United States Steel, Great Northern preferred, Amalgamated Copper and Smelting 1. The Gould stocks were again very weak.

NEWSPAPER MAN ASSISTANT TREASURY SECRETARY (By United Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—Robert O. Bailey, a former newspaper man, at present secretary to Secretary McVeagh of the treasury, will become assistant secretary of the treasury on the first of March. Bailey, as a newspaper correspondent, accompanied President Taft to Panama before Taft was president, and later was recommended by the president to his present position. The appointment of Fred W. ehmann of St. Louis to succeed Bailey was announced.

MARRIED GLOVER TWICE. Johnson succeeded in bringing out the fact that although Mrs. Glover was supposed to have been married in 1890, her marriage certificate was dated 1900. She said she had married Glover twice, because a technicality rendered their first marriage illegal. She denied intimacy with Glover before their marriage, and also denied intimacy with other men. Mrs. Glover was forced to tell her life history under Johnson's skillful questioning. She said she came to Boston when 12 years of age and earned a living by doing housework and caring for babies. When she was 21 she joined a theatrical troupe and traveled with it, posing as a "living statue." Later she said she purchased a laundry with her earnings and installed Glover as manager.

PLACTS PREMIUM ON TEMPERANCE NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—Here is Andrew Carnegie's method of fighting intemperance on his estates in Scotland. "The rule in Skibo," he told the diners at the banquet of St. Andrew's society, last night, "is that any man who goes to the office on January 1 shall have a bonus of 10 per cent of his wages if he has not tasted liquor during the year, except on the advice of a physician. That, I have found, is the most powerful argument of a temperance nature ever delivered in Scotland."
