

"HYPNOTIC EYE" MADE HER WHITE SLAVE

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 30.—It was Charles Peters' hypnotic eye that caused Minnie M. Hill to give up honor and her girlhood home in Redding, Cal., and come to Portland in company with the man who used her to secure an illicit living, according to the story told by Miss Hill today.

In an almost hysterical condition, Miss Hill called the police station to send an officer to her room at 482 1/2 Washington street. He found her scantily garbed and in a serious nervous condition. "I want to be good, to be decent again, and to go back to my mother, but I can't while I'm with

him," she half sobbed, half moaned.

"His eyes keep me from being decent. He has power over me whenever he looks at me. Had he been with me when I called for help I do not think I would have had nerve enough to go through with it.

"It was in Redding that I met Peters, when I was only 16 years old. I am 19 now. For the past three years my life has been one of unmentionable horrors. Peters forced me to become a woman of the streets.

"My father was an Odd Fellow, but he is now dead. I wish that some of his lodge members would come to my aid."


