### GENERAL NEWS.

J. T. Cleveland, an American, has been killed by a Cuban policeman at Pinar Del Rio.

C. A. Curry and wife, at Pueblo, Col., quarreled bitterly and as a result fought a pistol duel. The woman was killed and the man will die.

The Cuban congress is being impounded to appropriate \$14,000,000 to pay the balance due the revolutionary soldiers of the rebellion from Spain.

In Colorado the democrats elect Adams governor beyond doubt, and possibly Mrs. Grenfell for state superintendent of public instruction. The republicans elect all three congressmen.

Mrs. Phillis E. Dodge, of New York, has been convicted of smuggling into the United States precious stones valued at \$44,000. Under the law, the gems are now the property of the United States.

One dairy company asks for 3800 square feet at the Lewis and Clark Exposition, upon which to establish a model dairy.

Unofficial figures show that Yamhill county went prohibition by 28 votes, but the official canvass will be necessary to positively settle it.

The O. E. & N. and the city of Arlington have compromised. The company will pay \$1200 for the right of way instead of the \$2000 originally demanded.

Dan McLeod and Sinclair Swanson will wrestle at Vancouver, B. C., for \$1500. The articles stipulate that McLeod must throw Swanson three times in one hour.

August Giersinger, a butcher at Wilson Creek, Wash., tore his arm on a meat hook November 3. Blood poisoning at once set in and the limb was amputated on the 19th.

# BAKER CREAMERY

FARMERS RECEIVE \$20,000 PER MONTH FOR CREAM.

Nine Hundred Cows Are Furnishing Milk for the Haines Creamery—Four Thousand Dollars Interested in Plant—Two Thousand Pounds of Butter Marketed Daily From Small Country Village.

Twenty thousand dollars distributed in the section around Haines, Baker county, and North Powder, Union county, by the Rock Creek Creamery Association, incorporated, between March 1, 1904, and today, means that one new plant in Haines is a success, says the Baker City Democrat.

The Rock Creek Creamery Association of Haines, Baker county, is manufacturing gilt-edged butter of a purity and solid food flavor which compares with the best made butter to be found in the wide, wide world, namely the peerless product of Switzerland.

Four thousand dollars represents the cost of the present creamery building and machinery. The plant has taken the place of a smaller one, which was destroyed by fire in the spring of 1904. The creamery association is directed by Manager E. D. Severance, a gentleman of perfect executive ability and of years of experience in modern butter making.

Nine hundred fine milch cows have supplied cream for butter making. First-class separators are used at these farm homes and the pure cream is sold to the factory at Haines. On the 15th day of every month the farmers are paid for the cream furnished by their cows.

Two thousand pounds of choice butter can be made and marketed daily from the Rock Creek creamery. Shipments are made daily. An eager market is now supplied throughout Eastern Oregon and Idaho to steady consumers. The creamery is right on the line of the O. R. & N. Co.'s railroad, only 10 miles from Baker City.
