FULTON INQUIRES

MAKES A TOUR OF COUNTY AND THE RESERVATION.

Assures All Interested Parties of His Desire and Expectation to Secure Needed Legislation, and Makes Especial Inquiry Into the Subjects of Reservation Leases and Trailing Across Indian Lands—His Visit Was Necessarily Short.

United States Senator Charles W. Fulton, of Astoria, who was in Pendleton Saturday evening, was in Umatilla county for the purpose of inquiring into matters pertaining to Eastern Oregon national legislation. Senator Fulton made a trip through the Umatilla reservation in company with Frank Curl and Colonel James H. Raley. Sheepmen, stockmen and farmers alike, appear pleased by the assurances given them by the senator regarding their needs and desires. "Senator Fulton," said Mr. Curl, "is anxious to do anything in his power that will tend to uphold the interests of the state. Questions affecting the leasing of reservation farming lands, and the driving of flocks and herds across the government reserve, were looked into very thoroughly by Mr. Fulton."

The senator's visit was necessarily short, as he was obliged to return home in order to finish up his business before starting for Washington to attend the next session of the national congress.

Forster's New Offices.
Robert Forster has about completed a commodious office building in front of his planing mill. The space vacated by the removal of the office from the main building will give him room for the installation of a large amount of new machinery which he has ordered.

Bowman Hotel Opened.
The doors of Hotel Bowman were thrown open to the public this morning and Mr. Bowman, the owner of the new building will conduct the business himself, until he secures a suitable renter. The third story will not be furnished at this time.

Mrs. O. W. Moon Dead.
Mrs. O. W. Moop, wife of O. W. Moon, oldest engineer on the La Grande division of the O. R. & N., died of pneumonia at La Grande Saturday evening, after an illness of a week. Her husband is now engineer on the Elgin branch, and was the first man to run a locomotive into Grand Ronde valley, on the construction of the road.
