Walla Walla-Wallowa Road.

Interest in the proposed electric railway from Walla Walla into Wallowa county by way of the north country, increases rather than abates. The more the route from this valley to the north end is investigated, the better it seems. The railroad grade from Enterprise to Joseph cost less than \$3500 a mile. The road to the north would cost no more, say those with experience in that sort of work.

A survey of the road to Troy can be made for \$1000, says Engineer R. I. Long. It is proposed that this amount be raised and the survey put through as soon as possible.

Alfred Gardner, formerly of Enterprise, and now connected with the Walla Walla Union, writes that the incorporators of the Washington-Oregon Traction company are leading business men of that city and that they mean business. The capital stock is \$1,500,000. The trustees are Max Baumeister, Samuel Sharpstein, C. K. Holloway, John Smith, W. A. Ritz, E. S. Isaacs, J. L. Sharpstein and A. Reynolds.—Enterprise News-Record.

Thief Keeps Money, Returns Check.

One of the boldest and most open handed robberies which has occurred in Walla Walla for a long time happened Friday when Mrs. Lucy Ellige of Washucna laid her purse, containing \$30 in cash and \$50 in checks on the counter of a millinery establishment while she purchased a hat, and when she reached for the purse again it was gone.

Mrs. Ellige at once put an advertisement in the Morning Union and Saturday afternoon a letter came to this office through the mail, addressed in rude print. In the envelopment were two checks, one on the cashier of the Bank of Washucna for \$20 and one on William E. Lusk for \$40, but the \$80 in cash was not returned.

The case has been placed in the hands of the police.—Walla Walla Union.

VAST PHILIPPINE FORESTS.

Virgin Timber Lands Untouched in Lands Across the Sea.

New York, Dec. 11.—Major Ahern, head of the forestry bureau of the Philippine islands, is in New York for the purpose of attempting to interest lumbermen in the forests of the Philippine island.

"Few Americans realize the possibilities of the forests of our Philippine possessions," said he. "In the less populous islands of the Philippines there are immense forests of hard timber that could be substituted for valuable woods that have become scarce in Europe and America. We have there the wood of the narra, similar to the mahogany we know here; the aole wood is more beautiful than black walnut, and is used extensively for the same purposes. Molava is a light yellow wood used for general building purposes, while tangle and launa, soft woods, are excellent substitutes for pine.

"The forests of local and molava are extensive enough to produce millions of railroad ties, to which use their woods are adapted.

"The government is selling no timber lands, but is disposing of the standing timber as fast as possible under restrictions against cutting small trees, and thus providing against denuding the land."

LIFE OF TICKETS GREATER.

O. R. & N. Extends Time of Tickets Expiration to Day Following Sale.

People who buy local one-way tickets today and hereafter to travel on the O. R. & N. will not be bound by the printed notices on the pasteboards which limit their use to the day of sale, says the Spokesman-Review.

The local passenger office of the Harriman line received notice yesterday from headquarters in Portland directing conductors to honor tickets presented at any time during the day following the date on which they are sold, regardless of the printed clause on the tickets confining the limit to the day of sale.

The extension of the life of the local tickets, besides being a convenience to the patrons of the road, will relieve the company of the necessity of refunding the money on so many unused tickets. The regulation of the state railroad commission requires the railroads to repay the purchaser the value of an unused ticket on its presentation.

The steamship President Grant, with Secretary Taft and the members of his party on board, left Plymouth at 8:10 o'clock yesterday morning for New York.

Oregon has a railroad that is using the dirt from placer diggings as ballast. It is a matter of common knowledge that placer dirt contains a great deal of gold which is impossible to be extracted by any process known at the present time, hence the right of way of the Sumpter Valley railroad is being ballasted with a golden ballast, says the Baker City Herald.

Superintendent J. A. West has made a tour of inspection and the needed improvements along the line have been noted, which include a number of gravel fills and the straightening of the track in some places. Mr. West has not mentioned using the "Golden Route" as an advertising slogan in something the same way as Harriman uses the "Sunset Route" but it would be highly appropriate when it is known that the ballast being used on the road contains much of the valuable yellow metal.

Pasco's Future.

W. L. Allard, manager of the Davis-Kaser company's store at Pasco, is in the city on a short business trip. "Pasco is forging steadily ahead and is destined to become a big city some day," said Mr. Allard this afternoon.

"There has been an unprecedented demand for real estate, especially business and city residence property, with the result that building operations in all lines have been very active.

The Two Rivers irrigation project has received a slight set back by being thrown into the hands of a receiver, but the company's troubles are only temporary and will soon be adjusted. A great deal of permanent work has been done on the pumping plant and main feed canals and soon a big body of land will be supplied with water.—Walla Walla Statesman.
