Kansas City.—Bottled gas will be manufactured in Kansas City within the next year for distribution in Western Missouri and Kansas and will be offered in competition with the natural gas in Kansas City if the prices here are increased as planned.

A \$3,000,000 Southwestern corpo-

ration with a West Virginia charter, is considering the purchase of one of six cities in Kansas City for the manufacture of bottled gas. It is one of eight similar corporations organized to build plants in different parts of the country.

The principal directors of the entire scheme are Theodore N. Valle and Elbert E. Gary of New York and Frank S. Hastings of Indianapolis.
