## JUTE BAG ORDERS ARE HELD VALID

Olympia, Wash., Feb. 28.—The attorney general's department will hand to the state board of control today a formal ruling that the contracts for 2,247,000 grain bags recently ordered cancelled by Governor Lister are valid and binding on the state.

The ruling means that Walla Walla farmers, along with growers of the state, will get their sacks for eight cents. The ruling will also put the governor in the note for ordering the officials to break the contract, which the attorney general's department holds is clearly within the law.

This evening Cowen and Jones of the board, with the ruling in their pockets, will leave for Walla Walla to see that the "cancelled" contracts are carried out, and also to arrange for selling the remaining bags in accordance with the rules made, when the contracts were held up by the governor. The ruling comes as a complete surprise as it was thought the matter was settled unless some disgruntled growers saw fit to carry the case to the supreme court.

The only method left for the governor to prevent the growers from obtaining the bags is to remove the board or mandamus it, but the ruling would help the growers in case they carried the matter to court. The governor is expected to acquiesce in the ruling.

## BAKER WAS NOT THE ONLY ONE TO BE FOOLED

"Probably the most historical spot in all Oregon today is the region of the Big Applegate, where even the roadside is literally strewn with the history of Oregon.

"Some 12 months ago a sleek gentleman appeared in that country in the guise of Bosworth and began gathering local biography. For bait he used the honeyed flattery of a biography in a four volume centennial history of Oregon to be published by the Clark Publishing company, a Chicago concern, which he represented were getting out a history of Oregon written by Joseph Gaston. ## STEAM ROLLER HITS BEN HILL

Olympia, Wash., Feb. 28.—Representative Ben Hill of Walla Walla county was run over by the steam roller in the house when he tried to incorporate an amendment much desired by Walla Walla growers in Senator Sharpstein's grain bag bill. The amendment would have limited the sale of bales to any one individual to five thousand.

Hill has been "insulting" since he has been here and when the chauffeur of the steam roller saw Hill, he tooted once, put on more steam, and the bill passed without the amendment and was enrolled last evening. It will go to the governor today.

Senator Sharpstein is being congratulated by all the Walla Walla people here for pushing the bill through in a rush. Governor Lister is expected to approve both these bills.

## LOAN SHARK BILL PASSES SENATE

Shylocks Are Limited to Three Per Cent a Month by Measure.

Salem, Ore., Feb. 28.—The Latour-ette "loan shark" bill passed the senate after a debate prolonged merely because senators wanted more information. When the purposes of the bill were understood it passed by practically an unanimous vote.

Senator Butler explained the provisions of the bill, saying the measure was intended to curb the Shylocks who were preying upon the needy who at times had to have loans no matter what price was demanded for the accommodation. He said the bill did not affect in any way any legitimate bank or concern engaged in loaning money.

The bill provides that money lenders of the character reached by the measure must take out licenses, and that no loans can be made in sums greater than \$300 and no charges can be made exceeding 3 per cent per month. This refers to loans made on personal credit.

Senator Moser stated that an organization was being effected in Portland, where the loan shark evil is the most prevalent of philanthropically inclined persons for the purpose of providing funds to be lent in small sums to needy persons at a low rate of interest.
