

WHEAT PRICES SHOW DECREASE

Chicago Market Shows a Loss at the Opening and Closing of Trade.

CHICAGO, Aug. 28.—Wheat prices showed a slipping disposition after the start yesterday. Closing prices were 1-4c to 3-8c a bushel below Tuesday, while opening figures were at a loss of 1-8c for each of the three options.

After the opening there was a small amount of strength, which forced the market 1-4c higher, but this was subsequently lost when further short selling was forced. Broomhall cabled from Liverpool

that wheat opened with realizing, influenced by the increasing pressure of nearby American winter wheats. Latter there was a further decline on the fine weather in the United Kingdom. France and Germany, and the lower Paris opening. Private reports received here state that three fourths of the Canadian crop is safe from frost, and prospects point to a large yield there. The decline was checked by the strength in corn and firmness of Russian and Indian offers.

Bearing Down on Mutton.
Market for mutton is attracting the bearish attentions of killers and they are hitting prices here again. There was a fair offering in the yards today and late yesterday afternoon some additional supplies came forward. Aggregate run during the last 10 days has been unusually heavy and killers' wants are more than being taken care of.

This being the case, they are today in a position to buy at their own price. Sales of sheep are slow and at lower prices generally. Top lambs are not being quoted above \$5 and the extreme mark for ewes is \$3.55, with most offerings below this.

The weakness in the sheep trade here is shown in the face of the extraordinary good feeling in the trade at eastern points.

MEMBERS HAD RIGHT TO KEEP THE BEER

LEWISTON, Idaho, Aug. 28.—Realizing that the maintenance of a locker system for the disposal of liquor, and using lodgerooms as a place where other persons congregate for the purpose of drinking, is in violation of the Idaho local option law, attorneys for the Eagles lodge and County Attorney Miles S. Johnson came to a decision relative to the seizure of six barrels of beer Saturday morning and the case was dismissed.

Mr. Johnson says that the lodge was previously advised that the locker system as utilized was in compliance with the law and they believed that they were within its bounds. The lodge attorneys sustained the view held by Mr. Johnson that to hold liquor in such a manner meant a common nuisance. It was decided that if the lodge removed its lockers and promised to maintain no more liquor there the case would be dropped. Mr. Johnson stated that there was no question in his mind that the members of the lodge believed that they were within their legal rights and hence there would be no prosecutions.

The position taken as to the Eagles is the same as will be taken with other clubs in the city where it has been said that similar conditions existed. The law expressly allows a man to have all the liquor that he desires in his own residence and the keeping of the same in his residence is no crime.

The beer seized Saturday, billed to individual members of the lodge, will be returned to the men to whom it was shipped and they will be allowed to have it in their own residences.

The other clubs which will be affected by Mr. Johnson's ruling are the Elks' club and the German club maintained in the Bollinger hotel with a membership of nearly 3000.

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 28.—With a record list of contestants the Colorado state golf championship tournament began today on the links of the Lakewood Country club here. Nearly 100 players representing all the clubs in the state participated in today's qualifying round.

PARIS, Aug. 28.—The ordinances directed against the sale of opium, cocaine and other habit forming drugs went into effect today. They were the result of exposures following an investigation by the police department into charges that students of the Latin Quarter and residents of the Montmartre district have been running private drug dens. Wholesale arrests were made but the authorities failed to obtain convictions because the statutes were not comprehensive enough. The investigation disclosed that the drug habit has grown alarmingly in the two sections mentioned.

WILSON AIDS GIRL PLEADING FOR DOG

PARSONS, Kan., Aug. 28.—A Kansas girl and her pet dog, with the assistance of President Wilson, have broken down the street rule against dogs being permitted in Yellowstone National park. The girl is Miss Ethel Provost of Parsons, who received an announcement from the department of the interior that her request to take her dog "Fanny" into the park had been granted. The girl recently wrote the following letter to President Wilson:

"My father is soon to take the management of a hotel in Yellowstone National park. We have been informed that no dogs are allowed in the park confines. Mr. President, you don't know how sorry I am to hear this. I am 18 years old and our old dog Fanny is the same age. We have never been separated and I can not bear the thought of leaving her behind. She is very old for a dog, you know, and would not be able to harm any of the park animals. It would be terrible to kill her, don't you think? Now, if I promise to watch her carefully, can't you persuade the superintendent of the park to let me take Fanny along?"

President Wilson wrote that he would see what could be done. The interior department announcement followed.

DIAPHANOUS SKIRTS PRE-DICTED 200 YEARS AGO

CORNISH, Col., Aug. 28.—The arrival of the diaphanous hobble and the slit skirt, which threaten the modes of 1913, is the fulfillment of the prophecy and the hopes of Sir Charles de Puyssier Goodwin of Scotland, who lived 200 years ago, according to ancient manuscript found by Miss Faith Corson Smith in an old trunk in the attic of her home.

The manuscript was dated November 10, 1704, and reads in part: "The time hath come when I think there is much to be revealed to my children's children in clothing the human form. I can not believe that men will forever wear wigs, swords and knee breeches and such like fopperies.

"Ladies should not be so circumspect in their dresses, which are cumbersome and the long trains which please their majesties of this year of our lord seem to me naught but a design to conceal that which the creator meant should be revealed.

Perhaps posterity will learn that there is naught to be ashamed of in that which God hath created, no matter what station in life may be mentioned. "The creator never meant men and women to be so burdened with velvet ribbons, lace and powder that his handiwork should be concealed or distorted. The Romans, it seems to be, were much more sensible than we are today, and it may be in a dozen score of years that peoples of the world will grow these late changes, which are only worse than those which were their immediate predecessors."

QUEEN HONORS CARNEGIE.

THE HAGUE, Aug. 28.—The grand cross of the Order of Orange-Nassau was conferred on Andrew Carnegie by Queen Wilhelmina of the Netherlands in commemoration of the inauguration of the Palace of Peace, which takes place today.
