EXPORTS IN BEEF SHOW DECREASE

ON THE OTHER HAND IMPORTS IN FOREIGN TRADE HAVE INCREASED.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—(Special)—The recent transfer of the United States from the small list of beef exporting countries to the large list of beef importing countries is sharply illustrated by the August figures of imports and exports of beef and beef cattle and a comparison thereof with the August figures of earlier years just made by the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce of the Department of Commerce. This shows that the exports of beef and beef cattle have fallen from 44 million dollars in the 8 months ended with August, 1904, to practically 1 million in the corresponding months of 1913, and that the imports of cattle meat increased from \$357 in the 8 months of 1904 to \$40,195 in the same period of 1913, and their value from \$181,145 in 1904 to \$5,931,842 in 1913. As to beef, the importations in 1904 were insufficient to justify their statement month by month and the total value of beef imported for consumption in the full fiscal year 1904 was but \$14,922, while the single month of July, 1913, showed a total importation of \$42,394 pounds valued at \$55,992; August, a total of 1,151,626 pounds valued at \$38,204; and September about an equal amount.
Even the value of the comparatively small number of cattle exported is now less per head than in earlier years, despite the general advance in prices meantime. The average export price of the 1,300 head of cattle in the 8 months ended with August, 1913, was \$34, against an average of \$68 for the 418,865 head of cattle exported in the corresponding months of 1904. On the import side there is a decrease of about 20 per cent in the valuation per head, the 340,105 cattle imported in the 8 months ended with August, 1913, being valued at \$15 per head, compared with \$16 per head for the 9,357 cattle imported in the corresponding months of 1904. The character of cattle imported differs, of course, radically from that of those exported, being mostly, on the export side, grain-fed animals ready for slaughtering, and on the import side, grass-fed cattle in many cases but 1 or 2 years of age. Practically all of the cattle imported, other than those for breeding purposes are brought from Mexico, that country having supplied, in the fiscal year 1913, 291,477 of the 420,267 head imported for other than breeding purposes. Of the 1,388 imported for breeding purposes, free of duty, 945 were from England.
Imports of beef show remarkable gains within the very recent period. In the fiscal year 1904 the quantity of beef imported for consumption was 164,599 pounds valued at \$13,922 against 225,275 pounds valued at \$81,116 in the fiscal year 1910, and 957,790 pounds valued at \$308,934 in 1913; while in the single months of July and August the imports aggregated 642,394 pounds and 1,151,626 pounds, respectively, and partial returns indicate that the September figures will also approximate one million pounds.

EXCAVATIONS IN SCOTLAND REVEAL FOSSIL ORGANISM

EDINBURGH, Scotland, Oct. 20.—A singularly rich deposit of fossil organisms has been discovered. During recent excavations in the valley of Dura Den, which intersects the hills of Central East Fife.
For the past three months quarrying has been in progress under the superintendence of a representative of the British Association, and it is doubtful if any previous discoveries can compare with the fine collection at present being stored in an upper room of the Dura Den sawmill, ready for distribution among the various museums in the country.
The operations are being pursued to a depth of 10 feet, and the recent discoveries bear witness to the abundance with which ganoids of the old red sandstone peopled the waters. One most important find is that of the lowest and oldest known order of reptile to which belong the frog and the newt family. Another specimen is that of the perichthys or "winged fish," and yet another is what may prove to be a bothriolepis, probably the largest examples yet brought to light.
Both the last named are in perfect condition, their preservation having split lengthwise, displaying on the upper as well as on the under slab the sharp, clearly defined impress of the creatures. These specimens, the relics of countless million years, are of the utmost interest and value to geologists.

CATHOLIC CONGRESS MEETS IN BOSTON

BOSTON, Oct. 20.—Cardinal O'Connell today presided over the morning meeting of the second American Catholic Missionary Congress, held under the auspices of the Catholic Church Extension Society, which opened here yesterday with special services in all the churches of Greater Boston. The main sessions were held in Symphony Hall. An overflow meeting was held at the same time in Horticultural Hall, just across the street. The keynote address of today's main meeting was delivered by Most Rev. Judge E. Quigley, archbishop of Chicago, and chancellor of the Catholic Church Extension Society of America. The Rev. Joseph Schrembs, D. D., bishop of Toledo followed with an address on "The Spirit of the Congress." This afternoon's session was presided over by Rev. Joseph McGlinchey, D. D., director of the Propagation of the Faith Society branch in the archdiocese of Boston.
