## O.A.C. DEFEATS WHITMAN, 29-3

### OREGON LINE IS TOO HEAVY FOR GAME LOOSLY PLAYED.

WALLA WALLA Oct. 20.—Rushed off their feet in the first quarter and outplayed in every department of the game, O. A. C. came back strong in the second and third quarters and rolled up a final score of 29 to 3 against Whitman on Ankeny field Saturday.

Most of the scoring was governed by luck, but it was plainly seen in the middle of the game that O. A. C. had the better of the argument with her heavier men and more efficient line bucking. Two of the O. A. C.'s touchdowns were made on flukes, Chrisman and Shaw of the Aggies falling on the ball after it had been punted to Whitman, touched by the latter's safety and rolled over the goal line. Had the ball been allowed to roll over untouched, no score would have resulted.

Coach Stewart used 17 men in the game, three of his men being laid out by injuries and one ruled off the field for roughing it with Niles. Whitman's

only change was Hoover for McDonald at quarter in the third after which a noticeable improvement occurred in Whitman's offensive work. Hoover running the team in much better style as predicted during practice.

O. A. C. made a touchdown in every quarter and in the third also negotiated a place kick by Blackwell, Niles booted Whitman's only score over the goal in the last quarter, in a pretty drop kick.

## IT WAS JUST LUCK BUT IT SAVED THE CITY A COUPLE OF THOUSAND

"You ought to raise the salary of Superintendent Hays for the saving he has made the city on that one job," said Contractor Burton of the firm of Jeffrey & Burton the other day to members of the city water commission. He made the remark jokingly but he smiled rather ruefully while, for the joke came rather high, it costing his company something between \$1,500 and \$2,000.

The contractor and the commissioners were viewing the excavation for the new reservoir at the time and the former had been commenting upon the unanticipated difficulties encountered in digging down the required distance. That the difficulties were not anticipated was due to Superintendent Hays, though he did not intentionally deceive the contractor.

Before any of the competing companies put in bids for the contract of constructing the twin reservoirs, Superintendent Frank Hays put two men at work digging down twelve feet on the reservoir site so that the character of the soil could be easily determined by the contractors. He selected a spot just about on the dividing line between the two proposed reservoirs. The two men, with pick and shovel, dug a hole twelve feet deep, ten feet long and four feet wide in a day. They found that the dirt and gravel yielded readily to their implements.

Each of the contractors in turn inspected the hole before putting in a bid. Their figures were based upon the character of the soil which the hole showed. The bid of Jeffrey & Burton of Portland was the lowest and

## OPTIMISM RULES CATTLE MARKET

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 20.—(Special.)—Receipts for the week have been, cattle, 1931; calves, 412; hogs, 2151; sheep, 2921; horses, 42.

Optimism has ruled the cattle market this week and prices are five to ten cents higher than they were six days ago. Prime steers are five to ten cents higher than they were six days ago. Prime steers and cows were in demand and sold quickly. Best load of steers averaged \$5 early in the week. Other top sales were \$7.75 to \$7.80 and \$7.90 in small quantities. Butcher stuff had a good outlet and buyers filled orders with some choice cows, bulls and stags. Bulk cow top was \$6.50 and \$6.75 with one load at \$6.90. Steer range closed \$7.50 at \$7.75 and bulls \$5.90 and \$5.50. A slight flurry on Thursday eased prices off about a nickel but the stock offered was not extra choice. By and large the beef situation has been very favorable.

Portland's swine market can always be depended upon for surprises. It sprang a full dime to \$8.75 and this advance was made notwithstanding a total receipt as large as that of last week. Outlet has greater capabilities than the trade anticipated and the run was disposed of at seller's prices. Swine weights were better also, and quality averaged high. Bulk of light swine sold at \$8.25 to \$8.65. Heavy weights \$7.25 to \$7.80.

Mutton buying was limited to ewes, as yearlings and old wethers were not offering. A strong ewe top at \$3.90 was established and three full cars went over the scales at that figure.

The lamb market was quiet to Wednesday and then set a new October record by going to \$5.50 for an extra choice lot of Washington stock, representing the tall end of the 1913 lamb run from the Cascades. Bulk lamb top on average good grades is steady, \$5 to \$5.25.
