

Comedy and pathos mingle in our strange pictures for Tuesday and Wednesday. The headliner is "The Stroke of the Phoebe Eight," an Edison. "Extremities" is a vaudeville featuring Maurice Costello and Clara Kimball Young. Here is something novel. ABUTMENTS FINISHED AT SAVING TO COUNTY

BRIDGE STRUCTURE WILL BE BEGUN AS CONTRACT IS READY TO BE LET.

At a saving of a good many hundred dollars, the county court has completed the concrete abutments for the steel bridge at the Joe West place on the Walla Walla river and the Portland Bridge & Iron works will now complete the structure. While the exact cost of the abutments is not yet ascertained, Judge J. W. Maloney declares it will be but little more than half what it would have been had it been done by contract.

This is the second year that the county had done all of its concrete work in connection with the construction of bridges, and it has meant a saving of a considerable amount of cash. The best bid the county has ever received for concrete work was \$10 per yard and the highest price it has ever paid on any job work done under the supervision of Engineer C. H. Martin is a little over \$6 per yard. The work done at the Joe West place by the county consisted in the construction of abutments, an arch culvert for the irrigation ditch and two wing walls, one sixty feet in length and the other 240. The excavation done is pronounced by Engineer Martin as one of the most difficult tasks they ever undertook.

The bridge when completed will be a 90 foot steel structure and replaces a 70 foot wooden truss bridge. This bridge was found to be in such good condition that it was taken apart, shipped to Weston and set up again on concrete abutments a mile south of that city.

The county has one more bridge yet to make this year to bring the total number constructed during the year up to an even dozen. This remaining bridge will be located two miles south of Weston.
