

WILSON CANDIDATE CHOSEN IN JERSEY

FIELDER ELECTED BY LARGE PLURALITY OF 18,000 OVER OPPONENTS.

TRENTON, N. J., Nov. 6.—The latest returns indicated that Fielder, democrat, has a plurality of 18,000 over Stokes republican, and Colby, progressive. A democratic legislature has been elected.

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 6.—Reports from the election Tuesday placed the plurality of Walsh, democrat, at 20,000 for the governorship. Bird, progressive, is second; Gardner, republican, third; Foss, the present democratic incumbent, last.

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 6.—Blair Lee was chosen senator. The state, city and congressional tickets were strongly democratic. No governor was to be elected.

SALT LAKE, Nov. 6.—H. M. Wells and W. H. Shearman were elected city commissioners, and H. H. Green and A. G. Felk was elected the first mayor under the commission form of government.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—The prohibitionists dried up a number of towns in Illinois. Among the places carried for prohibition were Jacksonville, Petersburg, Hinckneyville, Percy and Beardstown. Duquoin went wet.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—The upstate towns which elected democratic mayors included Buffalo, Utica, Rome, and Troy. The following went republican: Poughkeepsie, Rochester, Auburn, Albany, Binghamton, Amsterdam and Watertown. In Elmira the Fusionists won. Johnstown elected a progressive.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Nov. 6.—Newton Baker was reelected mayor here. In Cincinnati Judge Frederick Spiegel, republican, was elected mayor with the entire ticket. George J. Karb, democrat, was reelected mayor in Columbus.
