Coming—"A Bachelor's Honeymoon"

That great Hoyt theater success, "A Bachelor's Honeymoon," under the management of A. DR. COE IGNORES PROTESTS AND ENTERS FORMER HOME

WITH WRIT AND OFFICER HE INVADES THE RESIDENCE OF HIS WIFE.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 17.—Another chapter in the marital troubles of Dr. and Mrs. Henry Waldo Coe occurred Friday, when a tea party at Mrs. Coe's residence, 841 Lovejoy street was interrupted by Dr. Coe and a deputy sheriff who demanded some papers left in the house by Dr. Coe. According to a friend of Mrs. Coe, two women, both prominent in the campaign for equal suffrage in Oregon had been invited to the residence. While they and their hostess were enjoying a luncheon a man who said he was an officer demanded entrance to the house. He was accompanied by Dr. Coe.

The three women protested, but the men made use of a pass key, which Dr. Coe is said to have, and entered. They procured some papers for which it is said they had obtained a court writ.

One of the women attempted to intervene to make a plea with the officer.

"Never mind, we do not want to talk to Mrs. Pankhurst," she was told, according to the woman who described the incident.

The men then left, but a short time later, it is said, an attempt was made to learn the identity of the two visitors. Fearing a court summons to act as witnesses they left.

The separation suits filed by the Coes involve the ownership of a residence which is occupied by Mrs. Coe and other property. Dr. Coe, it is said, lived at the house until recently, and Mrs. Coe has made herself practically a prisoner within it to hold possession. Dr. Coe still retains his keys and Mrs. Coe has obtained a court order preventing Dr. Coe from interfering with her possession of the place.

SULZER OFF TO LECTURE.
New York Governor to Include Portland in His Itinerary.
NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—Ex-Governor Sulzer will start on a lecture tour of the leading cities next Saturday night. The subject of the lecture will be "The Treason of Tammany." Sulzer will tell the full story of the plot through which, he says, he was removed from the office of governor.
The opening lecture will be at Buffalo, and among other cities to be visited are Pittsburgh, Detroit, Cleveland, Chicago, Philadelphia, Kansas City, St. Louis, St. Paul, Denver, Salt Lake City, Portland, Tacoma, Seattle, Spokane, San Francisco, San Diego and Los Angeles.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 18.—Announcement of the postponement of the Frankie Burns-Johnny McCarthy 20 round contest from November 21 to November 24 was made here.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—Congressman Hawley of Oregon, will, in the near future, have the appointment of another West Point cadet from his district. The examination will be held at Vancouver Barracks, April 20, 1914.

PORTLAND, Nov. 18.—The city commission has adopted its budget of municipal expense for 1914. The levy will be 7.7 mills on a valuation of \$208,000,000 and should produce \$2,731,800.

PORTLAND, Nov. 18.—Announcement was made by the Portland office of the U. S. Forest service that 2023 acres of land in the Siuslaw national forest has been listed with the secretary of the interior to be declared open for settlement and entry. The Siuslaw forest lies in Tillamook, Lincoln, Lane and Coos counties.

PORTLAND, Nov. 18.—J. N. Teal, C. W. Hodson and C. S. Jackson have been named official delegates of the Portland Chamber of Commerce to the National Rivers and Harbors congress, which meets at Washington December 2, 4 and 5.

PORTLAND, Nov. 18.—A contract for the sale of approximately 40,000,000 feet of saw timber in the Olympic national forest in Washington has been awarded to the Snow Creek Logging company, Seattle, by the Portland office of the U. S. forest service. The value of the timber is \$67,150 and 35 per cent of this will be returned by the government to the state for use in school and road improvements.
