

GOOD CLASS CATTLE HANDLED IN YARDS

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 15.—Receipts for the week have been, cattle, 1656; calves, 29; hogs, 7402; sheep 3902.

Cattle.—An exceptionally good class of cattle were handled all week, the feature of the latter part of the week being a very large number of grass cattle from central Oregon. Top steers went to 8 cents.

Hogs.—One of the largest days for receipts was Monday, when nearly 4000 head were unloaded. Notwithstanding, liquidation was prompt and tops, 1400 of them, went at 6 cents, which price remained standard for the week.

Sheep.—Sheep continue strong, both as to numbers and price. Sales have been brisk. Outlook continues firm. The lamb market is very steady with an extreme price at \$6.25 for tops.

CONVICT ROAD WORK IS MUCH IN FAVOR

TWENTY-FIVE GOVERNORS GO ON RECORD AS RECOMMENDING SYSTEM.

Provides Healthful Labor for the Prisoners and Makes It Easier for Them to Get Employment After They Are Released—Public Gets Benefit in Better Roads.

NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—(Special.)—Twenty-five governors have placed themselves on record as favoring the working of convicts in the construction and repair of highways, according to a compilation of the discussions of prison labor in their last messages to the legislature, recently issued by the National Committee on Prison Labor.

Convict road work is advocated by the governors both because of the healthful nature of such work and owing to the fact that convicts who have been employed in this way can more readily find employment when released; while many of the governors also point out the benefit to the public from better roads at a minimum cost.


