HIGH PRICES WHEAT GIVE WAY AT PORTLAND

Chicago Market Closes Lower After Opening With An Advance in Both Options.

CHICAGO, Jan. 7.—Early bullishness and higher prices in the wheat pit gave way soon after to extreme weakness with lower prices. The market for wheat options opened 1-4 higher for May and 3-8 for July and closed 1-2c lower for May and 3-8c for July.

There was a report that Armour was a moderate seller of the May and this caused general losses.

The talk on the floor was that Canadian oats were being offered on the spot market. Broomhall cabled from Liverpool that wheat opened with speculative support and shorts covered. Support was attributed to firmer Manitoba offers, improved millers' demand and fewer and dearer La Platta offers and a better spot trade. Arrivals are lighter. European visible shows a decrease of 1,792,000 bushels. Argentine offers of new wheat are few and dearer. Crop advances continue favorable. Foreign crop summary is generally favorable.
