OREGON INCOME TAX COLLECTORS NAMED. WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—The treasury department has not appointed any deputies or agents for the collection of income tax in Oregon, but names will be sent in very soon. Collector Miller of Portland has submitted a list of names to the commissioner of internal revenue. Strictly speaking, he has nothing to do with the appointments and his recommendations will hardly be considered, as the agent supervises the local collector's work and is answerable only to Washington. Blanks on which to make out individual returns from the income tax have been mailed to Portland.

SPINSTER TAX IS FOUGHT IN KANSAS

TOPEKA, Kan., Jan. 8.—The state of Kansas puts a tax on widows, spinsters and bachelors, and the widows and spinsters want it removed. Several efforts heretofore made to remove this tax have been blocked because they would also remove the tax on bachelors, and this the state does not want to do. Under the constitution the man at the head of a family receives a tax rebate on \$200 every year. The bachelor, the spinster and the widow do not receive this rebate. An old maid school teacher, by working hard and skimping, managed to support her three brothers and sisters on \$60 a month, but she has to pay taxes on every penny's worth of furniture she possesses. Across the street lives a widower with three children and almost a duplication of the spinster's personal property, but from taxation because he is the "head of the family." A bachelor is in precisely the same dilemma as the widow and spinster but as soon as he marries he comes under the exemption.

WHERE IT PAYS TO TRADE SAVE YOUR T. P. W. TRADING STAMPS

ALLEGED BRIBES MADE IN FORM OF COAL TO EMPLOYEES

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 8.—The Western Fuel company's list of beneficiaries extended not only to employees of various liners sailing from this port but reached beyond to government employes themselves, according to evidence presented by the government's prosecutors in the trial of

the fuel company's officers, charged with having defrauded the government of duties on imported coal and "drawbacks." Four customs house employes and one army officer, it was testified, were the recipients of the company's benefactions.

The list submitted contained the following names: E. Farmer, clerk to Collector of Customs D. Finnegan; inspector; A. H. Freund, assistant weigher; J. B. Twigg, assistant weigher and Major Grant, former assistant to Major Grant, former assistant to

Major Young of the United States army transport service at this port. The donations were in the form of coal and the dates on which the gifts were made began in 1907 and extended to 1913.

By the admission of this evidence the government expects to show that the Western Fuel company sought by means of the gifts to suppress information relative to the short weight of coal discharged into the bunkers of ships at San Francisco.
