# RUSSIA IS PREPARING TO GRAB SCANDINAVIA

DESPITE DENIALS, ACTIVITIES POINT TO DANGER OF AGGRESSION.

Norway and Sweden Apprehensive of Movements of Russian Troops—Heavy Increase for National Defense Said to Be Justified on Part of Smaller Nations.

STOCKHOLM, March 27.—Is Russia preparing to grab the Scandinavian peninsula? This question is being thoroughly threshed out in the campaign that is now on looking to the election of a new Riksdag. A good many facts have been brought forward, which despite semi-official denials from St. Petersburg, tend to support the belief prevalent throughout Sweden and to a certain extent in Norway that there is real and imminent danger of Russian aggression and consequently ample justification for an immediate and heavy increase of expenditures for the national defense.

Here are some of the charges against Russia that are made by the conservatives who are supporting King Gustav's program for a lengthening without delay the term of compulsory military service as well as extensive appropriations for enlarging the navy and improving the land fortifications. Finland, just across the Gulf of Bothnia, is now being permanently garrisoned by the Twenty-second Russian army division—25,000 men. Two other divisions are stationed just over the Finnish border, near St. Petersburg, from which locally they could be drawn and thrown into Sweden within ten days by means of the new military railways which have recently been completed in Finland and which extend right up to the Swedish frontier. Army strategists assert that within three weeks Russia could place 150,000 men in the field against Sweden.

In the past three years Russia has been secretly engaged in building extensive fortifications on the Finnish west coast, and is now said to be violating the treaty of Paris of 1856 whereby the Aland Islands were to remain unfortified. For several months past there has been an unusual increase in the number of Russian tramps and peddlers throughout Sweden, especially along the eastern coast in the north. A number of these when arrested were found to be in possession of military maps similar to those used by the Swedish general staff. It was noted that oth-

ers, who professed to be merely wandering Russian peasants looking for work, not only bore no signs of manual labor on their hands but could speak Swedish fluently. In this connection the espionage scandal of last fall is recalled as the result of which the Russian minister and his military attaché were compelled to leave the country. It was also openly charged that the former Princess Maria Pavlovna, wife of Prince Wilhelm, second son of Gustav, was a particularly active Russian spy. She, too, has fled and the prince is now suing for a divorce.

The Swedish conservatives are making good use in their campaign of the words of Dr. Fritzof Nansen, the Arctic explorer, who in addressing an anti-government mass-meeting the other day in Christiania attacked the radicals for preferring the promotion of all sorts of social reform instead of increasing Norway's defenses, and said: "I fear that the day will soon come when Norway and Sweden will have to unite against a common enemy for the defense of their neutrality and independence."

In the meantime Russia is doing all she can to allay the Swedish suspicions. Says the Novoye Vremya, semi-official organ of the St. Petersburg Government: "If the Swedes should exercise a little more perspicacity they would readily see that their potential enemy is Germany, and that it is from the Wilhelmstrasse that their baseless suspicions of Russia's ulterior design against its Scandinavian friend and neighbor have been fostered. In case of an armed collision between Russia and Germany the latter power would at once endeavor to establish a naval base at some point on the Swedish coast; consequently it behooves the Swedes to be prepared for such an eventuality by rendering their coast defenses as far as possible impregnable. This is the precautionary task of the Swedes, instead of uselessly lavishing their treasure on their land frontier defenses."

# \$6,000,000 AT ISSUE IN STRANGE OLD CLAIMS

WASHINGTON, March 27.—Six million dollars at issue in twenty-six claims now being considered here by an international tribunal on arbitration. The commission, tucked away in an obscure building, is slowly grinding away at its work. Many of the claims are hoary with antiquity and replete with interest.

Most important is that made by Great Britain in behalf of the Cayuga Indians resident in Canada. It is claimed that the ancestors of these aborigines were prior to the war of 1812 deprived of their rights, which they had in a perpetual annuity of \$2300, which the state of New York agreed to pay for lands ceded to it by the Cayuga nation. The petitions hold that since 1809 only American Cayugas have been paid the annuity. The amount claimed with interest, amounts to nearly \$1,000,000.

Among the American claims there is one by heirs of William Webster, who they claim, purchased lands in New Zealand from native chiefs about 70 years ago. Great Britain grabbed the property. It amounts to \$170,000. A similar amount is involved in a claim made by one Studor, for concessions given him by the Sultan of Johore, and which he was later deprived of. The United States is represented in claims for the seizure by Canadian officials of American fishing vessels, and Great Britain in a counter claim for vessels seized in Bering Sea by the United States. Great Britain is also pressing claims for cutting of the oceanic cables at Cienfuegos, Cuba, in 1898, and in Manila Bay during the Spanish-American war.

The tribunal to pass on the claims includes Hon. Henri Fromageot of France; Hon. Chandler P. Anderson, formerly counselor of the American department of state; Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, chief justice of Canada.

# PLANTS AS WELL AS HUMANS HAVE AFFINITIES

WASHINGTON, March 26.—To the uninitiated it would seem that more than the Atlantic ocean and a few hundred miles of land separated "Affinity" Earle in Paris and a field of cow peas in Arkansas, but the Bureau of Plant Industry has just proven that forage crops have a natural affinity marked as the notorious artist. Cow peas in particular have an affinity for oats.

It has long been known to scientists that some plants are benefitted and some are injured by association, and recent experiments have demonstrated that leguminous plants, including peas, clover and alfalfa, when planted with certain cereals show a natural increase in productivity. It appears that the leguminous plants not only gather nitrogen from the atmosphere by means of their root-tubercle bacteria and are therefore able to make a large growth, but that some of the nitrogen so gathered is passed on to the nonleguminous plant associated with it.

The affinity of the stalkwart (timothy) for the blushing red clover has long been understood by farmers in a general way, and now it has been demonstrated that Timothy has another affinity in alfalfa. Needless to say

clover and alfalfa do not get along very well together.

"The increased growth of plants in combination over that of single crops, together with the improved composition of the former, has resulted in some cases of an increase of more than 30 per cent in the production per acre. This increased value probably extends to the roots and the stems left in the soil and means much in the production of food for stock and in soil improvement.

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# CROWN PRINCE NOT TO GO.

Hint Given German Parliament Would Not Pay for Trip to Africa, BERLIN, March 27.—The trip to

Africa which the Crown Prince had purposed this year has been definitely abandoned. It is understood the reason is the Emperor's objection to the crown prince's interrupting his work on the general staff of the army by such a long absence.
