### PRESBYTERIANS PLAN CHANGES IN BOARDS

#### GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO RADICALLY ALTER MISSIONARY BODIES.

CHICAGO, May 21.—A radical reorganization of the home missionary board of the Presbyterian general assembly was the chief discussion among the 300 odd delegates who are in Chicago today from all sections of the United States and a number of foreign countries. The assembly will be in session here until May 24.

Insurgents in the Presbyterian church are determined to reorganize the home missionary board so that it will be of more service, according to Oliver B. Williamson, in charge of the general arrangements for the assembly which is being held at the Fourth Presbyterian church, the pastorate of Rev. John Timothy Stone, the retiring moderator. His claim has been made, Williamson states, that the home missionary board has become so centralized, and so unconstituted, that the churches and home mission field had no voice in the policies of the church. It is to correct this condition, that the "progressive element" in the assembly wishes to overhaul that body, he claimed.

At this session, the 126th annual meeting held by the Presbytery of this country, it is expected that the way will be paved for the Rev. E. P. Hill, of the McCormick Theological Seminary, Chicago, to succeed the veteran secretary of the home missionary board, the Rev. Charles L. Thompson, who, it is reported, will retire in June. Dr. Hill admitted today that he had been approached on the subject of filling Dr. Thompson's place, when the latter resigns.

There is widespread interest in the election of a moderator to succeed the Rev. Dr. J. T. Stone. For many years various parties and groups have gone to the assembly with vigorous political campaigns for the election of particular candidates. But at last year's assembly in Atlanta, Ga., a sudden revolution came from this political wire pulling, and since that rebuke was administered, delegates said today, there have been no open moves made by any groups to "put over" a certain candidate.

#### Boy Hero Gets Whipping

DULUTH, May 22.—The fact that Theodore Trudel, aged 8, saved the life of his companion, Henry Nyberg, aged 4, did not save him a "rood, sound licking" when he went home with his clothing soaked with water. The Nyberg boy fell into St. Louis Bay while playing near the Northern Pacific railroad bridge on Kites Point. Theodore jumped in heroically and dragged his playmate ashore. Harry was badly frightened and had become strangled. Men heard Theodore's cries and after working with Harry, succeeded in bringing him back to his normal state of health.

Theodore hastened home. His mother saw the wet clothes, and despite Theodore's explanations gave the boy a sound trouncing.

"Didn't she know Theodore went in the water to save his playmate's life?" John Trudel, father of Theodore was asked.

"Sure, she knew it. But she didn't want the boy to go in the water this time of year. It's too cold."

#### FEMINISTS GAIN VICTORY IN SWITZERLAND.

GENEVA, May 21.—The feminist movement in this country, after a long fight in the courts, has achieved a notable triumph in opening up the profession of the law to Swiss women. The cantonal authorities of St. Gall had refused to allow Mile. Baement, though qualified for the legal profession, to practice as a solicitor. The federal Tribunal has now decided that this refusal was unconstitutional and has reversed the cantonal judgment.

#### GOVERNMENT SHOWS HOW IT SELLS ITS TIMBER

NEW YORK, May 21.—Models representing an acre of western yellow pine land in a national forest of the

southwest before and after logging were shown here today by the government forestry bureau in Washington at the opening of the forests products exposition. In the model showing the stand before the lumberman goes into it a few years old to large, over-mature, stag-headed individuals more than ready for the ax. In the second model the mature trees and all the others larger than a certain diameter have been cut and made into logs and cordwood. Special attention is called to the low cutting to avoid unnecessary waste.
