WHEAT UNDER ATTACK

CHICAGO, May 26.—Everything considered the wheat trade displayed anything but weakness for the day with closing prices 1-2c higher for May, 1-8c to 1-10c lower for July and 1-8c for September. First thing in order after a firm opening was a bear attack on the new crop months which caused a break. Short sellers seemed to lose confidence when the market failed to break under the even figures. It was a stubborn and gradually hardening market towards the close.

The cable news so far as it had any influence was bearish, as world's shipments were large, Russia offering wheat more freely and the continent reported in an overbought position. Northwest receipts at 179 cars this side of the line were not small enough to be a bullish feature. Reports from nearly all the leading crop experts out of Chicago houses were decidedly mixed, finding splendid harvest promise in Kansas and the southwest, but worse condition than a week ago in Illinois and Missouri. Private personal letters from southern Illinois and other big soft wheat sections complain seriously of a combination of dry weather and fly damage. John Inglis finds the condition poor for 225 miles west of St. Louis, the crop thin and firing in places. A report from Pittsfield, Ill., said wheat broke down from fly damage. The visible was the supporting feature late in the session.
