PANAMA CANAL WILL BOOM AMERICAN TRADE

CAPE MAY, June 26.—"The opening of the Panama canal will mean two billion dollars more business each year for the United States," declared O. P. Austin, formerly of the Federal Department of Commerce, in an address before the convention of the Maryland bankers' association.

"By using the canal, shippers in our Eastern seaports will save thousands of miles to ports in China, the Philippines, Australia and New Zealand and will be nearer them than in London, even by the use of the Suez canal."

Mr. Austin suggested that the government construct an inland waterway in the great lake section of the country, "which would reach into the interior for 1,500 miles and send forth great amounts of freight."
