**HOG WEAKNESS IS FELT**

(Courtesy of the Journal)  
 PORTLAND, Ore., June 28.—Notwithstanding the decreased offerings of swine at north Portland during the week, there was a fresh spell of bearishness in the trade, and prices showed a further reaction, with \$3 the extreme mark for everything.  
 The local market has recently failed to follow the lead of the swine trade in other parts of the country, and at this time is the lowest hog market in the United States, a condition that is usually reversed.  
 For years Portland was known far and wide as the highest hog market in the country, and this attracted many into the business here. Promoters promised that hog prices here should never go below those ruling at any other market in the country, but during recent months values here have dipped to the extreme low mark.  
 The truth of the matter is that the hog industry has been growing here faster than the demand for products. Provision prices here are regulated entirely by the price of hogs at Chicago, plus the freight of the finished product to Portland, therefore no matter how much increase is shown in the raising of hogs, the demand for the product will increase no faster than the population.  
 As long as eastern packers are given an even break in this market in regard to prices, they are sure to secure their share of the trade. This means just that much less demand for the local product, therefore that much decrease for the local hog.

**WHEAT ADVANCES LITTLE**  
 CHICAGO, June 29.—At the close Saturday July wheat was 1c over the extreme low point of Friday, the important break of the week. September at the close was 3-4c over the low point of Friday. December wheat closed at 81 3-8c on a rally from 80 2-4c, the low point of the morning. Northwest markets rather led the advance for the day, Minneapolis being 1-4c higher for July wheat at the close, southwest up about 3-4c from Friday. What there was in the way of bullish news for the day for wheat traders was largely in the way of borrowing trouble over the spring wheat crop. Very heavy rains at a few North Dakota points following the general rains in that quarter for the week, started a little uneasiness over the possibility of rank straw development, with the remote possibility, of course, of a rust scare later in the season. The only other bullish item for the day was the claim in some of the southwest states that farmers are holding their wheat in shocks instead of accepting present prices. The bearish considerations are the same as those which have ruled the market all week—favorable harvest progress, even larger yields in many sections than estimated, liberal purchases of new crop on bids overnight for early arrivals and the selling pressure against the movement, which is sure to be important early next month.

 PARIS, June 27.—Another historical treasurer will soon leave France for the New World.  
 The committee charged with the erection of the monument to Jeanne d'Arc in New York has written to Rouen to the owners of the plot of land on which the walls of part of a ruined tower made famous by the warrior virgin were recently unearthed offering to buy the lot en bloc. It asked that the ruins be taken apart and that the stones be forwarded to America so as to form the pedestal of the proposed monument.  
 The offer has been accepted, and the ruins of the old castle of Rouen will soon be on their way to America.

 COPENHAGEN, Denmark, June 27.—Ole Olsen, a Danish miner, undertook to finance a new north pole expedition under the command of Knud Rasmussen, the Danish explorer. The expedition probably will start for the north next summer and will be provisioned for two years. All modern appliances are to be provided and Rasmussen is to have a staff of scientists. He will establish his base at Cape York, Greenland.
