Newsy Notes of Pendleton

Well Known Men Here.
E. C. Sanderson, president of the Eugene Bible college, accompanied by Rev. J. W. Muckley, national secretary of church extension work of the Christian church, visited a short time yesterday with Rev. F. Weaver of the local Christian church. Both men are on their way to Washington.

Missionary is Here.
Mrs. J. M. Stearns, national secretary of the woman's board of missions of the Christian church with headquarters in Indianapolis, is here today and will lecture this evening in the Christian church at 8 o'clock. She will speak on mission work as carried on in foreign countries.

Neal in Politics Again.
James P. Neal, former freewater attorney who made the race for the republican nomination for district attorney against Frederick Stelwer, Saturday announced his candidacy for the office of county attorney of Walla Walla. There is much rivalry for the place. Besides Neal, E. W. Benson, E. L. Casey, and J. H. Bauer are after the republican nomination while M. A. Stafford, present incumbent, and others are after the democratic nomination.

Shoots Himself Through Foot.
Joe Colesworthy, well known high school student and son of Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Colesworthy, is hobbling about with difficulty as the result of accidentally shooting himself through the foot while on an outing with Judge J. W. Maloney, J. H. Gwinn, C. O. Henry of Athena and Harold Maloney. He was ejecting the shells from the magazine of his gun, a .22 rifle, when it exploded in some way. The bullet struck him just above the little toe and went clear through the foot without injuring the bone. The wound was dressed by members of the party and, upon the return of the party yesterday, a physician redressed it. The party went to Meadow Creek in Union county but had but indifferent luck.

This is the fourth day of his illness and a marked change will probably result before long.

Roesch Will be Filed.
The will of the late William O. Roesch was filed and admitted to probate today and by its terms his widow, Anna Roesch, is made the administratrix and principal heir. In the petition for probate, the value of the real property is estimated at \$25,000 and of the personal property at \$5,000. The will was drawn up in 1893 and specified that each of the three children, William L., Freda A. (now Mrs. Fred Stelwer) and Herbert O. Roesch, should receive \$1000 upon attaining their majority. The residue was to go to the widow, W. F. Matlock, F. W. Vincent and V. Stroble have been named as appraisers of the estate.



Northwest Interests Resist Rate Change

PORTLAND, Ore., June 29.—Manufacturers of fire doors and window sashes in the northwest who are resisting efforts of eastern manufacturers to make up in readjustment for rates for the depletion of home supplies in raw lumber, appeared before the interstate commerce commission Examiner Pugh who took testimony in behalf of the intervening interests in Oregon and Washington. E. G. Donaldson, traffic manager of the Westcoast Lumber Manufacturers association, presented facts and figures to show the present rates should be sustained and that increase rates of the finished product would be unjust discrimination against the locality which is still rich in raw material and against the localities that have no longer such resources.

CONNECTICUT WOMAN HELD IN CONNECTION WITH MYSTERIOUS DEATH OF A POLITICIAN



Mrs. Helen M. Angle, a wealthy and good looking grass widow, well known to society in Connecticut, was taken into custody by the police in connection with the mysterious death of Waldo R. Ballou, member of the city council of Stamford, and long a politician in that part of Connecticut. The case has created a sensation throughout New England, where both parties have friends and relatives.

The police did not, when they made the arrest, charge Mrs. Angle with murder. The man was found on the sidewalk just at the door of her apartment with his head crushed. In the woman's room, which the police who found the dying man entered, they found a bloody straw hat and some clothing of Mrs. Angle's with blood stains.
