

NEW ENGLAND'S "LITTLE BIG DITCH"



Entrance to the recently completed Cape Cod Canal. BOSTON, July 22.—The Cape Cod Canal, spoken of as “New England's Little Panama,” will be formally opened on July 29. The canal will shorten distances and will provide a safer route for 25,000 sea craft a year which have heretofore had to round Cape Cod. The waterway is eight miles long and is at no place less than 100 feet wide. The opening of the canal will attract thousands of persons from all over the country. Rockefeller Gives up Seat. NEW YORK, July 22.—William Rockefeller's seat on the New York stock exchange was posted for transfer to his son, Percy A. Rockefeller.

French Baron Visits Chicago. Chicago, July 22.—Baron de Taisne of Paris, captain of the twenty-fourth dragons of the French army, and his wife, arrived at the Blackstone hotel on their way to the Canadian ranch of Count Costa de Beauregard near Calgary, Canada. “I intend to invest in lands for a ranch either near Edmonton, Canada, or along the Peace river in the Canadian Rockies,” said Baron de Taisne. “Count Costa de Beauregard is my brother-in-law and a nephew of the late Marquis de Beauregard of the French academy.”

Still Chance for Artists. BOSTON, July 22.—Although more than \$5000 has been spent in trying to obtain a suitable design for the memorial in Mount Auburn cemetery to Mrs. Mary Baker Glover Eddy, founder of Christian Science, the directors of the First Church of Christ (Scientist) of Boston have been unable to obtain a sketch which meets with their approval. The directors are still seeking an artist who can give a design of impressive lines and embody the features deemed necessary. The fund, after deducting the \$5000 spent in the attempt to procure a design, is \$47,500, given by members of Scientist churches.

Home Hints and Recipes

Hungarian Ware
The new Hungarian ware with its vivid colors is effective with willow furniture. This ware is made by the peasants. It is of non-descript color, not white, nor yellow. The garish decorations are of flowers and garlands in pinks and greens.

Jelly Bag
Fold two opposite corners of a piece of cotton and wool flannel three

fourths yard long. Sew up in the form of a cornucopia, rounding at the end. Fill the seam to make more secure. Bind the top with tape loops by which it may be hung.

Summer Mats
If you have any odd bits of cretonne left from making draperies or pillow covers, make the pieces into round or square mats and edge them with the cheap eorchon lace one can buy on the bargain counter for 5 and 10 cents a yard. Bureau scarfs and table scarfs of cretonne, edged with lace, tone in well with summer draperies at the windows and covers on the furniture.

Salt as Cleaner
To clean willow furniture, scrub each piece well with coarse brush and water that is strongly saturated with salt, then dry with a soft cloth. Salt not only cleans willowware, but prevents it from turning yellow. Straw matting may be most successfully cleaned in the same way.

Net Slips
Summer attire makes all that is worn underneath of additional importance as to cut and decoration. The princess slip is worn by many women in preference to the separate petticoat. The slip fits with kindly deference to the lines of the figure and are intended to take up as little room as possible under the outer garments.

Net, either plain or figured, is delightful for slips. There is a liking for the sheer organdie, which fashions so many of the new undergarments. Whatever trimming is used on the slips is applied flat about the top and in the form of a lacy or net frill at the hem.

CENTRALIA MAYOR WINS OUT AT RECALL ELECTION

CENTRALIA, Wash., July 21.—Recall election staged in Centralia yesterday was a complete failure. H. W. Thompson, mayor; A. E. Sears and W. B. Kier, commissioners, not being voted out of office.

Sears' majority was 270. Thompson's 83 and Kier's 6. All but four of 12 precincts returned majorities in favor of the commission form. The election was a surprise in that several precincts supposed to be strong for recall returned substantial majorities against it. The individual vote was: Thompson, 764 to 687; Sears, 860 to 590; Kier, 731 to 725. Only 1,457 votes were cast out of total registration of over 2500.

The Anti-Recall league, formed to combat attacks of Victor Johnson in a recall publication, pressed every available automobile into service and took voters to the polls in droves, 1,000 votes being cast between 4 and 7 o'clock. Many things favored the commission, chief of these being the fact that a municipal gravity water system is under course of construction and a change of administration might prove disastrous to this \$200,000 project and majority of the seven charges filed against the commission were groundless on their face.

Charges included allowing city to remain beyond its legal limit of indebtedness; permitting existence of disorderly houses in city; permitting sale of liquor therein, accepting tribute from fallen women; selling water for drinking purposes that they know to be impure; entering into contract with cement firm for which Commissioner Sears was agent, and allowing local saloons to operate without observing state law.

IRA N. MORRIS OF CHICAGO, FOR MINISTER TO SWEDEN



IRA N. MORRIS OF CHICAGO, a member of the family of packers, has been nominated by President Wilson for minister to Sweden. He is now on a special commission to Europe in connection with the Panama exposition. Though Mr. Morris is a stockholder in the big packing company at Chicago he does not give his personal attention to its affairs. Senator James Hamilton Lewis presented his name. Mr. Morris was first suggested for ambassador to Italy, and later for ambassador to Russia.

Captain Dies on Lake Boat.
DULUTH, Minn., July 21.—With his master lying dead in his state-room, the passenger steamer South America came into port from Chicago with all flags at half-mast. Capt. William A. Mackay, who took command of the South America at the opening of navigation this season, died on the vessel at 4 o'clock in the morning. Death came suddenly and was attributed to heart disease by the ship's surgeon and by Dr. J. B. Miller of Chicago who was a passenger.

ATLANTIC SHORE CRAFT IN OCEAN YACHT RACES

CAMDEN, N. J., July 22.—Much interest was manifested today and brought here many leading members of the Atlantic seaboard yacht clubs in anticipation of seeing many of the best Atlantic short crafts which will start today in the Philadelphia to Baltimore ocean yacht race. The regatta committee announced that it has many interesting events on its program today for the enjoyment of the visitors. The race will end at Baltimore July 24.

Lost Forest Chief Trained.
FRESNO, Cal., July 21.—A heavy brown woolen shirt, water soaked, mud stained and torn to shreds, was dragged from Dinkey creek, near North Fork, six miles northeast of Fresno. The shirt is the one worn by Louis Margolin, chief forest inspector of the Sierras, when he disappeared while making a trip across the Sierras June 19. Forest rangers are dynamiting the creek in an attempt to raise the body.

Insurance papers, card case, knife and diary were found in the pockets of the shirt. The diary was written up to June 16, the remaining leaves being torn out, leading to the belief that Margolin had attempted to light a fire. The two top buttons of the shirt were unbuttoned, while the rest were torn from the shirt, giving rise to the theory that Margolin fell from a foot log just over the hole from which the shirt was recovered, struck on a huge rock and plunged unconscious into the creek. His brother in New York offered \$1000 reward for the body.

FIRE ALMOST DESTROYS CENTERVILLE, WASH.

GOLDENDALE, Wash., July 21.—Fire that started in a moving picture theater at Centerville, Wash., last night while a film was being shown wiped out nearly half of the business section of the town, endangered the lives of several persons and threatened the wheat fields about the town. The spectators in the theater escaped uninjured, but the moving picture machine operator, Ray Pierce, was severely burned on his arm. Centerville, which is eight miles from here, has no fire-fighting apparatus of its own. A relief call was sent to Goldendale and 100 men responded in autos. At 11 o'clock the fire was under control. The loss is said to be about \$15,000.

The chief losses were: J. E. Jusilla, general merchandise store; Absher & Niva, hardware store, planing mill and lumber yard of Roy McLavey, and a small hotel, confectionery stand and stationery shop. There was little insurance on any of the burned buildings.

He has carefully kept away from the jurisdiction of the Oregon courts, where this matter is pending.”

Since then she has been investigating the chances of compelling or persuading the merry minstrel, who admits to owning a wig and clogs, to pay up. Her inquiry soon brought to light a certain Mrs. Stone, whose trunks are being held by the St. Francis awaiting the payment of a hotel bill. “I have information that Mrs. Stone is now in Los Angeles,” resumed Mrs. Primrose, “and that she is having more than considerable to say about the arrangement of the bungalow and its furnishings. One of the causes of the trouble between Mr. Primrose and me was his actions with women.” Close inquiry is being made in San Francisco as to George Primrose's possessions.

Mine Rescue Teams Complete.
SEATTLE, Wash., July 22.—A number of mine rescue teams from coal mines of the state, are competing here today on the University of Washington campus, in the first contest of its kind ever held in the northwest. A tunnel and smoke house were constructed and the teams are required to “rescue” bodies from the smoke filled rooms and apply first aid methods. So many teams were entered that the exhibitions will last over tomorrow.



Again Refuses China Loan

PEKIN, China, July 21.—The Chinese government in June asked the five-power loan group for \$500,000,000 pounds (\$40,000,000) for redeeming short period loans up to 1914. These bear 7, 8 or 9 per cent interest. After referring the question to London the group declined to advance the money stating that the loan would be possible only if China should guarantee to take a loan sufficiently large to cover the expense of currency reform. The minister of finance asked the power group to reconsider its decision. The reply received this morning is to the effect that while the group is always ready to discuss questions relating to loans it will be unable to lend further sums unless China guarantees to undertake currency reform.

Therefore, unless China recedes from its position another deadlock in the negotiations is expected. Many officials have been won over to the idea of currency reform and this fact, in conjunction with the tangled currency problems of Canton and Manchuria, will, it is thought, force the government to accede to the demand of the five powers.
