NO RESIDENT OR OREGON NEED REMAIN UNTRAINED

State University Offers This Year 68 Correspondence Courses in 19 Groups of Studies.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore., Sept. 23.—Sixty eight correspondence courses, free except for the nominal fee that covers postage but intended mainly for residents of Oregon, are offered by the state university this year to the people who cannot leave their regular work to attend a higher educational institution.

These 68 courses are in the following subjects: Architecture, bird study, botany, debating, economics, education, electricity, English, geology, German, history home biology, journalism, literature, mathematics, philosophy, physics, psychology, sociology.

Among the new courses are several of especial interest to Oregon teachers: History of modern elementary education; secondary education; problems in education; advanced courses in teachers' English composition. Dr. H. D. Sheldon of the department of education, and Dr. George Rebec, professor of philosophy, will this year aid in giving correspondence instruction.

The correspondence department is intended to put higher instruction within reach of all state residents. As much as one third of the work for a degree may in exceptional cases be taken in the correspondence department. One student, a senior this year, will have made 27 of the 120 required hours by correspondence; another has completed 25 hours. Bulletins containing a full list of courses will be sent on application.

BERLIN IS HAPPY OVER SEA VICTORY

BERLIN, Sept. 24.—(via the Hague).—No mention of German casualties was made in an official announcement of the sinking of three British cruisers by German submarines. It was believed all the submarines escaped.

Berlin is jubilant.

On all sides it was declared that it evidently was the admiralty's policy to continue a German naval campaign along such lines until the British fleet was sufficiently reduced to enable the fatherland's vessels to engage it on something like even terms.

Judging from the submarines' latest exploit, it was declared this policy seemed likely to prove successful.

The war office maintained the Germans' land campaigns were going well.

DISTINGUISHED SCULPTOR TO DESIGN \$1,000,000 BUILDING

OAKLAND, Cal., Sept. 23.—A. Sterling Calder, the distinguished sculptor who did most of the sculpture for the Panama-Pacific exposition, has been engaged to design the panels and terra cotta decorations for Oakland's new \$1,000,000 auditorium. Calder will receive \$8000 for the work.

The facade of the auditorium will be the most distinctive in its architectural effects. More than 400 feet long and of imposing height, it is pierced by a number of arches backed by niches. The facade is of granite and the niches and panels will be terra cotta, beautifully modeled in symbolic designs.

Calder is well known as a sculptor both in the east and on the Pacific coast. He was the designer and sculptor of many beautiful groups of statuary which have given him much fame, and his engagement to do the work on the big auditorium is considered proof that it will be one of the most artistic buildings of its kind in the country.

Air Bombs From Steel Cage

LONDON, Sept. 23.—The method used by Zeppelin airships in dropping bombs has been described as follows by an English refugee, who has just arrived here from Belgium.

The dirigible hovers over its objective at a sufficient altitude to keep it out of range of the enemy's guns. At the same time it lowers a steel cage attached to a steel wire rope 2,000 or 3,000 feet long. This cage is divided into compartments and it carries one man, whose duty it is to throw down the bombs. The man is sufficiently strong to make rifle fire against it ineffective and because of its small size and the fact that it is kept constantly in motion it is very difficult for heavy guns to hit it.

Refugees from the scene of the fighting around Mons report that airmen took a prominent part in directing the German artillery, says the Times correspondent in Paris. Aeroplanes hovered over the British position and their pilots signaled the German batteries by means of a disk swung at the end of a line.


