For years the people of eastern Oregon have wanted one of their number in the governor's Our County Is chair. They have On The Ballot. longed for a man in the state house with first hand knowledge of this section, of its needs and possibilities. This state has never had an eastern Oregon governor.

There is now a chance. For weeks past the candidacy of Dr. Smith has been growing stronger and stronger until his election is all but assured. His campaign manager declares that without doubt he will carry Portland and that his election is a certainty if he can but hold his own in the remainder of the state.

That announcement should fire the people of Old Umatilla county to do their utmost for Dr. Smith. As in the primary election much is going to depend upon how this county votes. The heavy vote cast for Smith in this county was a powerful factor in making him the democratic nominee. A landslide vote from this county next Tuesday will help mightily in turning the tide of battle in his favor. It is more than probable it will be the decisive element in the election.

Let us unite in one grand move to place a Umatilla county man at last in the gubernatorial chair. This county is entitled to that distinction; this is the banner farming county of the state; it is the second wealthiest county in Oregon and one of the strongest from a population standpoint. Why not demand recognition? Dr. Smith's candidacy places Umatilla county upon the ticket for he is known chiefly as a Umatilla county man. It is here he spent most of his life. It is here all his property interests are located; it is here he made the record that gave him the nomination for governor. If this county is ever to have a man in the governor's chair now is the time. Every consideration of local interest and local pride calls for his election and the occasion is such partisanship may well be laid aside for the moment.

Let us once more roll up a Smith vote that will make the world take notice.

There are cold facts in relation to the cost of bridges under the Gilliland administration and those From His Record. facts should be sufficient to cure any taxpayer from wanting Mr. Gilliland in office again. The Main street bridge in Pendleton, erected by the city, cost on a basis of

five and a half cents per pound for the steel. The Matlock street bridge, erected by the city, cost on a basis of six cents per pound for steel. The Joe West bridge near Milton, erected by the present county court, cost on a basis of five cents per pound for steel.

Of all the 35 "Eberhart" bridges thus far investigated one only has been found that cost on a basis of six cents for the steel. It was the very first bridge he built.

A large number of the remaining bridges erected under the "Eberhart system" have been checked up and it is discovered those bridges cost Umatilla county on a basis of from nine to 13 cents per pound for steel. In other words the steel in the "Eberhart" bridges which steel is inferior in grade to the steel in the Main and Matlock street bridges, cost more than twice what the city of Pendleton paid per pound for the steel in the powerfully built city bridges.

This robbery of the county was the natural result of the system under which for four years A. E. Eberhart enjoyed a monopoly of the bridge contracts of Umatilla county. How that system was worked has been explained by this paper several times. Yet there are people who claim this paper fights Gilliland for political reasons only and is throwing mud at him. He is not opposed for mere political reasons and there is no mud slinging by this paper. The East Oregonian has merely hurled Gilliland's own record at him. It is a record that shows this county was outrageously plundered during the Gilliland term as judge. The East Oregonian has been showing up the ex-judge because it believes the charges against him are true and because it has written and sworn data to bear out those accusations.

The people will say what they think of the matter Nov. 3.

In every previous race for membership in the legislature C. A. Barrett made a particular Barrett's appeal for democratic Democratic votes on the ground he Record. was progressive in thought. It was largely through democratic votes he was elected first to the house and then to the senate.

At the last legislative session a contest arose as to whether J. S. Hodgkin or E. E. Kiddle was the regularly elected senator from Union county. Mr. Hodgkin was the democratic candidate and Mr. Kiddle the republican. The returns showed the contest extremely close and some peculiar work having been discovered regarding the counting of the votes in one precinct the election was contested. The case was tried before Judge Knowles, a republican, and the votes of the precinct in question were recounted by that republican judge and his republican clerk. The recount showed Mr. Hodgkin, democratic candidate to have been elected by a few votes over Mr. Kiddle.

When Mr. Hodgkin sought to take his seat in the senate he was barred out by the reactionary machine that was in control and of which machine

C. A. Barrett was a servile member. The contention was made by "Swamp Land" Thompson, the machine leader, that the provisions of the corrupt practice law regarding the recounting of votes by the circuit court was unconstitutional and that the senate had exclusive say in the matter. That being the case he wanted the republican seated whether he had the right number of votes or not. Accordingly Kiddle was seated and Mr. Hodgkin who had overcome the heavy republican majority in the Union-Wallowa district and had been honestly elected to the senate was "steam rolled" in cold blood. C. A. Barrett who had been elected largely by democratic votes was one of the gang that did the work.

Those who wish a joint senator from this district a political slyster who can lay his principles aside when convenience demands should vote to return Barrett to the senate; those who wish an honest man as joint senator should vote for J. N. Scott.

He remarked that Canada did not consider a German invasion imminent just now, and that the relation of the Monroe doctrine to such an improbability hardly had been much considered.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Oct. 28.—Delegates from Wisconsin, Illinois, Michigan, Iowa, Minnesota and South Dakota attended the annual Northwest Road Congress, which opened a three day session here today. The governors of nearly all the states represented will attend the sessions and speak sometime during the week. Methods of road building and upkeep will be discussed and there is a large exhibit of road building machinery.

ident of the American Medical association; Jane Addams of Hull House, Chicago; Governor Woodbridge W. Ferris of Michigan; Chase S. Osborn, republican nominee for governor, and Dr. J. H. Kellogg, of the Battle Creek Sanitarium.
