POLICING A WAR IS A VERY IMPORTANT ITEM

FEW PEOPLE KNOW THAT SUCH THING EXISTS BUT IT'S QUITE ESSENTIAL.

PARIS, Oct. 26.—(By Mail to New York.)—Policing a war is just as important as policing a city, yet the man-in-the-street probably doesn't know any such thing exists. In fact "war policemen" are more important than city policemen since not frequently the fate of a nation depends upon efficient work by this body of men.

While Rheims was being bombarded by the Germans I spent two full days in the quarters of Colonel Joly who was then in charge of the work of policing the front in that immediate territory. Six spies were shot—two being women—while I was in the vicinity and dozens of suspects were caught in. Spies are the big game "war policemen" must be on the lookout for. The war on the French side is policed and kept "orderly," as far as possible by the gendarmes. The gendarmes are professional soldiers corresponding to cycle or mounted policemen in the United States who police country districts and who, in certain parts of the country, are called "seventy policemen." In France he polices the country and cities as well (Paris excepted) in time of peace, while during the war he polices the country immediately back of the firing line. While the French were retreating before the Germans, the war policemen had little to do, comparatively speaking, but while advancing as was the case from Paris to the region between Somme, Soissons and Rheims, the gendarmes had their hands full. Here is why. While the Germans were going back they left many soldiers in French territory. Some of these soldiers were ordinary deserters. Some were in civilian clothes, spoke French perfectly and acted as spies. Others were isolated groups of soldiers, lost from the main body, and who lived in the woods by day and roamed the countryside at night looking for food, also for means of rejoining their regiments. French looters are dealt with mercilessly. A soldier who took a few trifles from the pockets of a dead trooper, trifle not worth more than a few cents all together, was given three years in prison. I remarked to the Colonel that the sentenced appeared rather too heavy. "Yes," he admitted frankly, "it was heavy. But we cannot tolerate pilfering in the army."

So well is the French army policed that throughout a long trip through a country literally swarming with hungry and tired and smoke craving, but tobaccoless soldiers, not a cracker or cigarette or tablet of chocolate was taken from our party of four though we left such things unguarded for hours at a time within easy reach and plain sight of the men. "Police headquarters" in the army are often crude, uninviting places. The "cooler" at Colonel Joly's headquarters near Rheims was a stable, the floor of which had been cleaned off and straw about a foot thick put in. Here the receiving sergeant held forth and here, too, German, French and other prisoners had to sleep, all together, in their clothes and on the hay. Newspaper correspondents have been known to sleep in this particular "cooler" for having come too near the zone of operations without proper permits. Next door to this war-time cozier cots snatched contentedly. The colonel himself, with his staff

of seven officers, occupied a suite in the farmhouse which formed Brittany style, part of the stable. The Colonel slept on a mattress without bedclothes of any kind, his only covering being an army blanket. He slept in his clothes, his staff sleeping in theirs in straw piled on the floor. The war policemen slept in the hay lofts and wherever else they could find room. The owner of the farm with his sons being in the army fighting, the rest of the family were relegated into one little room. Policing the front is done in exactly the same way that a city is policed. The surrounding country is divided into beats and squads of men police these beats, so many hours off, so many on day and night. But, as the Colonel remarked: "Policing a battle line some 200 miles in extent is some job."
