**HEALTH BOARD
TELLS HOW THE
RABIES DEVELOP**

HOW THE DISEASE MAY BE RECOGNIZED IN ANIMALS—TIMELY ADVICE GIVEN.

In the view of the fact there is so much rabies over the county, the following articles describing the symptoms of the disease in dogs, taken from the report of the state health board, will be of timely interest:

1. The first symptoms is a change in the dog's disposition; usually it becomes more sullen.
2. Restlessness, growing into a tendency to wander away. Two of the people who were bitten in Portland were from their own dogs—household pets—that had returned home bedraggled and covered with mud and mire, evidence of having been on a long run, and when their mistress attempted to give them a bath they were promptly bitten.
3. A tendency to snap or bite anything that moves, often developing into a perfect fury.
4. Refusing food and usually drink but may attempt to eat indigestible objects like stones, leather, dirt, etc. A rabid dog, during the early stages

of the disease, can drink water, and the word hydrophobia is really a misnomer.

5. A change of voice, the voice becomes a hoarse, high-pitched sort of a half bark and half growl.

6. A tendency to tremor, with a possible blindness of the right eye, exceeding irritability, with a gradually increasing paralysis, usually beginning in the left hind leg, and becoming total and ending in dyspnoea or death.

7. A rabid dog does not froth at the mouth and does not always have fits. Setting a pan of water in front of him, and expecting, as is the popular belief, that he will "throw a fit" for diagnostic purposes, is an error. These are the symptoms of furious rabies. In dumb rabies the lower jaw is paralyzed early and drops down. The animal acts as though it had a foreign body in its throat, and persons are frequently inoculated in attempting to remove an imaginary bone.

The symptoms in all other animals are somewhat similar. Some animals strike with their front feet, while others bite. Rabid cows usually butt and a cat with rabies is more vicious than any other animal. When partially paralyzed it will crawl along and viciously bite at anything that moves. One that was recently killed by a police officer in Portland had attempted to bite all the members of the family, and was biting and scratching the bricks in the fireplace at the time it was killed. The question is often asked:

"How long will a dog live with rabies?"

The period usually varies from forty-eight hours to eight or nine days, and any dog living after a period of ten days can be assured did not suffer from the disease. The average length of time that all of the animals that have developed the disease here was varied from three to five days after the first symptoms appear.

Captured French Exiled.
GENEVA, via Paris, March 16.—Thirty thousands civilians inhabitants of French territory occupied by the Germans are being expelled through Switzerland in lots of 500.

The first thousand passed through Geneva yesterday. They were chiefly from Lillie and Maubeuge and consisted of old people and children under 10 years old. Some of the French children said they had often gone near the fighting line to get food. The exiles were sent across the French frontier by the Swiss authorities.

Robber Gets Life Term
LOS ANGELES, March 11.—Alfred Sells, confessed robber, was sentenced to life imprisonment in San Quentin Penitentiary for his part in the robbery of Fred Harlow and two other men in the Harlow residence some months ago.

Charles E. Sigh, alleged partner of Sells in various crimes, pleaded not guilty to the same offense. Sells is alleged to be one of two robbers who killed Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Vogel in their home in Oakland, Cal., recently.

**DOG KILLED AT GIBBON
AFFECTED WITH RABIES**

Examination Shows Presence of Germ—Three Dogs Have Been Lost.

Further proof of the existence of rabies in this county is furnished in a letter which W. H. Sayer of Gibbon has just received from Dr. Calvin S. White, state health officer who examined the head of a dog sent by Mr. Sayer to his office after he had killed the animal. Mr. Sayer sent the letter to Dr. C. W. Lassen, county veterinarian, yesterday and in an enclosed note states that he has lost three very valuable dogs from rabies. The following is an excerpt from the letter of Dr. White:

"In the examination of the brain of the dog sent by you, which arrived at the office this morning, we find Negri bodies proving conclusively that the animal had rabies. It would be interesting to watch the stock you know have been bitten and probably not more than one third of these would in any event develop the disease. In the meantime their flesh is as good for food as any other.

It would be wise, however, to watch them in handling that you aren't bitten later on as the disease is liable to develop any time after the expiration of three weeks."

**OLD BLUE MOUNTAIN
LEAGUE REORGANIZED
FOR ANOTHER SEASON**

ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING OF FANS IS HELD IN THIS CITY LAST NIGHT.

Pilot Rock, Echo, Hermiston and Pendleton Favor Proposal to Give the League a New Lease on Life—Another Meeting Next Monday to Draft a Schedule.

There seems every season to believe that the Blue Mountain League will live again this year as a result of a meeting last evening in this city of fans from Pilot Rock, Echo, Hermiston and Pendleton. After a thorough discussion of the matter, the representatives of the four towns expressed themselves favorably toward the organization and another meeting, to be held in Echo next Monday evening, was arranged. At this time the formal organization and drafting of a schedule will be undertaken.

One thing was very apparent at the meeting last evening. The league must be an amateur affair from start to finish or it will die before the end of its schedule. That is, it must be amateur, not in the most technical sense of the word, but insofar as amateur means non-salaried players.

Recalling the days of the Blue Mountain league when Athena had her Soldier Prink, Walla Walla her Myrtle Mitchell and Pendleton her Joe Berger, and all drawing princely salaries, the delegates from Echo and Pilot Rock declared emphatically that they would not and could not be a part of a league that winked at violations of the by-laws. Hermiston's delegates, though their town has never before been in the Blue Mountain league, expressed the same sentiments. The Pendleton fans present hastened to give every assurance that Pendleton would abide strictly by the rules of the league. "We have had a belly full of paid players for awhile" said one of the local fans, "and no one need fear that this city will spend a cent for salaries this year."

L. D. Drake, president of the Blue Mountain league last year brought to mind the fact that Pendleton played a strictly amateur team last year from start to finish even though she held the cellar position. "Everything depends upon the officers of the league," he said. "The right kind of officers will see to it that each club lives up to the rules of the league."

The discussion last evening made it probable that the following provisions would be incorporated in the by-laws:

Sunday ball to be played; season to start about April 11 and end before July 1.

No salaries players allowed; each player must be bona fide resident of county for specified length of time before he plays.


Professional ball players who are bona fide residents not to be barred. No transfer of players from one club to another without consent of club managements.

Each club to put up cash forfeit to abide by by-laws.

Pilot Rock was represented at the meeting last evening by E. B. Casteel and Merwin Gilbert, Echo by Asa B. Thomson and Carl Gilbert, Hermiston by Henry Hitt, Al Larson, Harry Maltby and H. B. Giese and Pendleton by L. D. Drake, Roy Alexander, G. I. LaDow, L. G. Frazier, W. N. Matlock and others.

"Lefty" made good with Pendleton from the start last year and during the season won 17 games against 7 lost. Local fans would like to see him get on with some good club.

Among the ex-Western Tri-staters signed up with Russ Hall's Tacoma club are Pitchers Peterson and McIvor, Catcher Kari King, and Outfielders Johnson and Stokke.

**Score Cards Guide
Local Golfers Aright**

The Pendleton Golf Club has had printed tally cards for the convenience of players. They not only have spaces for marking down the scores hole by hole to enable the golfer to tell when he is doing exceptionally good or exceptionally poor and the distance he has to go from one hole to another. The "par," which signifies par excellence, and the "bogey," which stands for the mythical and extremely good score of Col. Bogey, as well as the number of yards is given after the number of each hole. Thus we have the following table:

It will be seen that there is a wide divergence in the distances between holes, from 127 yards to 403. However, this doesn't necessarily mean the shorter holes are more easily made. Indeed, there are times when they are harder because of the presence of more natural hazards. Thus in doing from 7 to 8, the distance is very short but a drive that falls short lands the ball in a deep ditch or rocky hillside, whereas if the ball carries beyond the hill it is very liable to roll down into another gulley. With fortune favoring, however, it is not a difficult matter to make bogey on this hole.

So far none of the golfers have succeeded in getting around the course in bogey form yet. Brooke Dickson came the nearest Saturday when he negotiated the course in 41 strokes and L. G. Frazier made it around in 41 Sunday.

On the reverse side of the score

Removed Official to Sue.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., March 13.—About two years ago while W. Frank Arant, of this city, was superintendent of Crater Lake National Park, he was requested by the Secretary of the Interior to resign in favor of Will G. Steel. Mr. Arant, asserting he held office under the classified civil service, refused to resign, as no charges had been filed against him. The matter was then presented to the civil service commission and they ruled in Mr. Arant's favor.

However, Attorney-General McFeynolds held differently, and Mr. Arant was removed from office by a United States marshal. Since then Mr. Arant's attorneys have busy in the matter, and it is said suit will be filed soon in the United States court of claims for Mr. Arant's reinstatement and for back pay.

IN CHICAGO'S NEWEST COURT**

CHICAGO, March 12.—Every woman her own Portia—and every man his own tribune. And this in a court where red tape is unknown and before a judge whose chief study is to hasten justice. For the realization of this Municipal Chief Justice Harry Olson has established Chicago's first cut-price, small-claim court.

Demurrers will be unknown. No claims for over \$25 will be allowed. Petitions for a suit demanding payments of debts are in "the simple language of the plain people." Court costs are only \$3. The working of the court is so plain that Chicago already is calling it the "poor man's court."

Judge John R. Newcomer who presides over the court will be a public referee in debt matters. "The debtor and the creditor, the bankrupt and the millionaire—all shall have a friend in court," according to Judge Newcomer. "Procedure is so simple that lawyers are unnecessary."
