PLANS UNDERWAY TO HAVE GARDEN STREET IMPROVED

PAYING WANTED FROM COURT TO RAILROAD—INCLUDED IN ALTA ST. PLANS.

Not only will another attempt be made to secure the paving of West Alta street from Main to Chestnut and Chestnut from Alta to Webb, but included in the same improvement will be plans for paving Garden street from Court to Railroad and Railroad street from Main to Garden. The council acted upon a petition signed by property owners last evening by passing the first resolution proposing to make the improvement.

The principal matter up for discussion last evening was the request of the Civic Club that the city purchase the strip of land east of the old cemetery. It had been referred a week ago to the street committee and last evening a report was made favoring the purchase of the strip at \$2000, payments to be made in yearly installments of \$500 and the Civic Club to make the first payment and the first year's interest on the deferred payments.

Councilman Cole moved that the report be laid upon the table and Councilmen Hill and Siebert immediately seconded the motion. This provoked a good deal of discussion pro and con. All of the members participating. Some thought the price was too high and others that it was reasonable, some considered that the city could not afford to make the purchase and others believed the investment a good one, particularly in view of the fact that the entire block would be secured by the purchase of the strip. In the end there was a deadlock, a vote showing four for and four against the purchase. The matter was thereupon continued for a week upon motion of Councilman Cole.

Upon the recommendation of the fire committee, the council accepted the bid of the U. S. Rubber Co. of California, to supply the city with 500 feet of Trojan hose at 80 cents a foot. The street committee's recommendation that Jerard & Temple be instructed to secure two Studabaker sprinklers for the city was adopted. In this connection the committee also recommended the sale of the old fire engine. An ordinance letting the street sprinkling contracts was passed.

The petition of north side residents to have the name of that portion of Matlock street north of Jackson changed back to Blaine was granted by vote of the council.

The council voted to lease the city steam roller to the county for \$3 per day and with the understanding that it be returned in good condition. The contract with Conner & Son to build the north side sewer laterals was approved and the deed from Ellen Livermore for right-of-way for the sewer was accepted and recorded. W. A. Rhodes was granted a restaurant liquor license for six months and several other minor matters were disposed of.

WILL SHE BE VICTIM OF A SUBMARINE?

man submarines, but she is a non-combatant. Her trip will take her very near the ground where a week ago a German torpedo sank the Lusitania and carried to the bottom a score or more of children like her.

Will Disprove German Claims. LONDON, May 19.—Officials of the Cunard line declared they would have many witnesses at the official inquiry into the sinking of the Lusitania to disprove the German claim that only one torpedo was fired at the liner and

that an explosion of ammunition was responsible for the heavy casualties. Fifty survivors have volunteered to testify, including 20 Americans, it was stated. The inquiry will be conducted by Lord Mersey and will open next week. For Sale.
