

LITTLE BOY GETS HIS FATHER OUT OF JAIL. INDIAN CHILD CRIES SO BADLY THAT HEARTS OF POLICE ARE TOUCHED.

Who says a policeman hasn't a heart? Any one entertaining such an idea would have had it dispelled Saturday evening had he witnessed a little scene in the office of Chief Kearney. One Alex James, well known Indian, arrived home Saturday from Portland where he had served three months in jail. To celebrate his release he at once got drunk. He was picked up at 10 o'clock by Chief Kearney and taken to jail.

His good wife, Josephine, called to see him at 11 but he was lying in a drunken stupor and could not be aroused. She was told to return at 6 in the evening. With her little boy she was at the station promptly at that hour. James was brought up but he was still under the influence of liquor and the three police in the office decided he was still too drunk to be released. They were just starting back to jail with him when they were arrested by a heart-breaking cry from the little boy. He had not seen his father for three months and that officers should again put him behind the bars was too much for him. And his cry was too much for the officers. Apologizing to each other, they all suggested that he be permitted to go home and, when the squad brought a buggy, they helped him in. The joy of the little boy was compensation enough.

BOILING WATER THROWN ON GERMANS IS CHARGE. OFFICIAL WHITE BOOK DE-CLARES BELGIANS ALSO MURDERED OFFICERS.

BERLIN, May 25.—The official White Book issued today charged that during the invasion of Belgium, Belgian civilians threw boiling water upon wounded German soldiers, maimed others and assassinated the officers quartered in their homes during the night. The White Book was published in justification of the measures of repression in Louvain and elsewhere in Belgium as well as being a reply to the recent official report of the Belgian commission.

GAS BOMBS AGAIN USED BY GERMANS IN WEST. IN ATTACK ON BRITISH POSITIONS, TUNTONS ARE THROWN BACK.

PARIS, May 24.—The Germans in Flanders again have resorted to the use of gas bombs, but in an attack upon the British positions they were thrown back.

The war office announced the attack was between Ypres and Streeu-straete. Behind a great cloud of chlorine the Germans charged, evidently expecting to find the British overcome. By the use of respirators the English were able to remain in their positions. The Germans were met with a terrific fire and virtually wiped out.

BERLIN, May 25.—The allies were defeated with heavy losses in two distinct drives against the Germans in the last 24 hours. It was officially announced. Reckless attacks were made between Neuve Chapelle and Givenchy and on the northern slopes of the Lorette Hills, the statement asserts where the allies were repulsed with great losses.

PARIS, May 24.—A German aeroplane flew over a north suburb of Paris early today and dropped several bombs. Slight property damage was done. No one was reported injured.

Holland Protest. LONDON, May 25.—Holland sent a note of protest to Germany regarding the loss of Dutch lives on the Lusitania, according to The Hague dispatches. The text of the protest has not been made public but it was said to be similar to the American note.

Germans on Offensive. BERLIN, May 25.—Renewing the offensive north of Przemysl, General Von Mckenzen's army have stormed and taken six strongly fortified villages and captured 20,000 Russians, an official statement announced.

HORSE AND MULE SHOW TO BE HELD OCTOBER 9. EXHIBIT WILL TAKE PLACE HERE, PROBABLY AT ROUND-UP PARK.

October 9 was selected as the date for the first annual Umatilla County Horse and Mule Show, the selection having been made at a meeting of the recently organized association last Saturday afternoon. The show will be held in this city, probably at Round-up Park, and an effort will be made to get a large number of entries. Hay and stall room will be afforded all exhibitors free of charge. One of the features being planned for the show is a high jump for horses ridden by cowboys. The officers of the show will attend the stock shows at Milton and Union to get a line on the management of these affairs.
