NEWS FROM THE FARM AND RANGE

Shipping Peaches—Hermiston is now engaged in shipping her first peach crop, according to reports brought from the project. Ten cars of this fruit will be shipped out, most of it going to Omaha from where it will be distributed.

The picking of the peaches and the packing commenced last Tuesday and fifty men, women and children are employed in the work. The payroll amounts to \$100 a day. The packing will continue for another ten days before the crop is all harvested. Most of the peaches are of the Elberta variety and are from trees planted six years ago.

The harvesting of the first peach crop with the revenue it brings into the country has had the effect of bringing smiles to the faces of the project settlers that rival the expansive grin of the wheat farmer.

Baby Zebra Born in Zoo. NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—A lively 70 pound male zebra baby was added to the Central Park menagerie. The zebra is three feet tall and three and one-half feet from tip to tail. Both mother and baby are doing well and the new pet will be shown to the public in a few days. This zebra is the first that has ever been born in this country, and as far as records show the first ever born in captivity.

American Consul Scored. LONDON, Aug. 14.—A prominent opinion is given by the Morning Post

to an attack on T. St. John Gaffney, United States consul at Munich, for his alleged "unneutral, pro-German and anti-British" attitude. The Post says he visited London some time ago to make inquiries regarding German prison camps and "while enjoying the hospitality of this country he was so loud in his expressions of anti-British opinion that he gave offense to many persons staying at the same hotel."

The Post charges that in other instances also Mr. Gaffney used "his official position as a housestop for the proclamation of his personal prepossessions."

HELIX BLAZE STARTS FROM EXPLOSION OF GASOLINE IN TANK

DAMAGE TO AMOUNT OF \$100 IS DONE BEFORE FLAMES ARE EXTINGUISHED.

Volunteer Fire Department Does Good Work in Getting Blaze Under Control—Pool Hall Sustains More Damage Than Other Buildings—Other News Notes of Helix.

(Special Correspondence.)

HELIX, Ore., Aug. 14.—A fire, which did about \$1000 damage before it was extinguished, broke out in Helix shortly before nine o'clock Friday night. The blaze started by a light being exposed near where a gasoline light tank was being filled at one side of Murphy's pool hall. The flame spread from the gasoline can in a space of five minutes over a portion of three buildings but the most damage was done to the building in which the pool hall and restaurant of B. F. Murphy is located. A vacant building belonging to A. L. Grover was more or less damaged. The loss on buildings is covered by insurance. The credit for saving the whole half block in which the fire broke out goes to the members of the volunteer fire department who had two streams of water playing on the fire within five minutes after it broke out.

A large number of the farmers in this section are already through with their harvest and by the end of another week the wheat crop of 1915 will practically all be in the sack. The yields of some fields have in some instances gone above their owners' estimates while in others they have fallen below, but as a rule the general result of the harvest in this section has been about as estimated before the cutting was commenced. Forty bushels to the acre has been a rare thing, but yields of 20 to 25 bushels are not much above the average for this immediate vicinity.

Randolph Cook, young son of Mr. and Mrs. T. M. Cook, was severely bruised Thursday evening when he was thrown off a bucking horse and fell on his head and shoulders, the shock causing him to remain unconscious for several hours.

George Hevers who left Helix early this spring for Idaho, is back while attending to the harvesting of his crop near Helix and reports that a large part of the grain near American Falls, where he now lives, is practically ruined by the frost.

W. H. Shannon has just finished building a fine new barn and machine shed on his farm one mile west of Helix, formerly the Knight place. Mr. Shannon also put down a deep well during the early summer and now has an abundant flow of good water.

SEWARD, Alaska, Aug. 14.—Pavlof volcano, situated on the Alaska peninsula, was in full eruption the night of July 23 last, with flames accompanied by heavy black smoke shooting from the crater. This was reported by Captain Hansen, of the Santa Ana, which arrived today from Behring ports. On his return trip six days later, Captain Hansen said, the crater was still active. He also reported Katmai volcano still smoking.

Alaska Has Few Salmon.

SEWARD, Alaska, Aug. 14.—A poor year for salmon packers, with a falling off of 40 to 50 per cent from a full pack, was reported here with the arrival of the Santa Ana, Captain Hansen, from Behring Sea ports. The Bristol bay canneries, according to Captain Hansen, lack 40 per cent of their usual pack, while at Kodiak, Unak, Seldovia and Port Graham, the season closes with only half a pack.

A full pack, however, is reported from Chiknik and Port Muller. The heaviest run of fish in Bristol Bay came from July 4 while fishermen were celebrating. One fisherman who was attending to business caught 2000 fish.

BRITISH PEOPLE GIVE \$2,500,000.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—A report just received at the offices of the commission for relief in Belgium, 71 Broadway, from the London offices of the commission show that there has been a recent great revival of interest in the cause of the destitute Belgians throughout Great Britain and the British colonies. Up to the end of July subscriptions to the fund in aid of the one-quarter of Belgium's population who are destitute had reached a total of about \$2,500,000. This does not include the donations from Canada, which approximately amount to another two million dollars. The gifts received by the London committee of the commission have come chiefly from other colonies, notably New Zealand, India, Western Australia and South Africa.

Of the amounts received, one of \$60,000 was the result of contributions by New Zealand and was sent through Thomas McKenzie, Lord High Commissioner of that far-away territory. From India and Western Australia contributions ranging from \$50,000 to \$200,000 have been received, and there were many minor contributions ranging from a few hundred pounds sterling to five figures each.

Washington Fires Few. OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 15.—Washington will have a year which will compare favorably with the record one of 1912 in fumes of forest fires, unless bad luck occurs from now on, says State Forester Ferris in a report. Timber losses to date this season have been only 5 per cent of those of last year to this time, and do not total 1,000,000 feet.

"Unusually rainy weather and more efficient patrolling is responsible for the light losses, the forester believes. The year 1912 was the worst one for the state, more than 20,000,000 feet of timber being destroyed.

"We have 90 fire wardens on duty now," says Mr. Ferris.

Pear Prices Advancing. NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., Aug. 14.—Chairman Paulhamus, of the Growers' Council executive committee, presided at a meeting at which steps were taken to renew the campaign to boost the pear market. Banks have agreed to get behind the campaign if 50 growers will sign a guaranty of \$100 each to cover any loss in marketing. Fifteen dollars a ton has been paid by cash buyers. The council will start buying tomorrow morning at \$7.50. The fruit will be marketed under direction of H. J. Davidson, of Hood River, who represents Chairman Paulhamus here.


