Newsy Notes of Pendleton

**Seeking a Ranch.**

**Baby Girl is Born.**  
A baby daughter was born yesterday morning to Mr. and Mrs. Frank Hann of 315 West Webb street. The little one weighed eight pounds.

**Got Nine Birds.**  
A hunting party consisting of John Adams, John Mumm, Glen Sturdivant and Bill Lay spent yesterday at Rocky Ridge and returned with nine grouse.

**Bootlegger in Court.**  
Frank McVey was arrested today on a charge of selling liquor to Indians and is being tried this afternoon in police court.

**Acting as District Attorney.**  
Osmer E. Smith, well known young attorney, is acting as district attorney in the absence of District Attorney Frederick Steiner, who is taking his vacation in the Willamette valley.

**Improve Apartment House.**  
C. P. and Ruth O. Barnett have taken out a permit to improve the basement of their apartment house on Willow street. The cost of the improvement will be in the neighborhood of \$1000.

**Thermometer Going Up.**  
Today is the hottest day Pendleton has had for several days, the thermometer this afternoon at 2 o'clock registering 94. The maximum yesterday was 91 and the minimum last night, 60.

**Water Main Breaks.**  
A six-inch water main at the corner of Main and Wilson streets broke about 1:30 yesterday morning and flooded the streets in that vicinity before Supt. F. B. Hayes could get the water turned off. Monroe street near the Nelson residence was damaged by the water to some extent.

**Loses Three Fingers.**  
J. E. Holder, well known employe at the Burroughs planing mill, lost three fingers this morning just before the noon hour in an accident. He caught his hand in the jointer and, before it could be extricated, three of the fingers had been cut so badly that they were amputated. A fourth was cut badly but the doctor thinks it will be saved.

**Auto Hits Bicycle.**  
While Al Richardson, the big colored porter at the Hotel St. George, was riding his bicycle south on Main street Saturday afternoon, an automobile, driven by George Ruge and turning from Main into Court street, struck it squarely. Richardson saved himself from injury by grabbing the front of the car and hanging on until the car was stopped. His bicycle, however, suffered, both wheels being broken.

**Return from Exposition.**  
James Bowler of the First National Bank and Brooke Dickson of the American National bank, arrived home yesterday from a two weeks' visit at the Panama-Pacific exposition. They returned on the steamship "Great Northern." Mrs. Dickson and baby daughter will stay at the coast until September first. Roy Buchanan, head of the drygoods department of the Peoples Warehouse, arrived home this morning from San Francisco where he met his parents who had come out from Texas.

**The Shells Wouldn't Fit.**  
C. O. Rinehart, local buyer for M. H. Houser, learned yesterday that a No. 10 shotgun shell won't fit a No. 12 barrel any more than a No. 10 shoe will fit a No. 12 foot. In company with Roy Horn he hid himself to Rocky Ridge yesterday to celebrate the opening of the grouse season. In due course of time they flushed a covey and Rinehart tried to slip some shells into his gun. He jammed and he jabbed and he fumbled and fussed but he couldn't ram the shells home. The birds having disappeared by this time, he cooled down and made an investigation. He discovered that he had purchased No. 10 shells and carried a No. 12 gun. Fortunately Horn had plenty of No. 12's and Rinehart was able to borrow enough to bag the limit.

**Mrs. Vaught Passes Away.**  
Mrs. Sophia Emma Vaught, a widowed lady who has been making Pendleton her home for the past two years, died this morning at 9 o'clock at her home on West High street following an illness of brief duration. Her health had been declining for some time but her last illness dated only from Friday. She was 61 years old, having been born in North Carolina March 20, 1854. She is survived by the following children: J. K. Vaught and J. G. Vaught of Fairfield, Idaho; J. E. Vaught of Bristol, Tenn.; Mrs. Sherman Westcott of Garfield, Wn.; Jabin, Josie and Glen Vaught of this city. She is also survived by a sister, Mrs. J. E. Haun of Elberton, Wn., a brother, W. R. Greig of Clarkston, Wn., and another sister, Mrs. Baird, of North Carolina. Her husband, J. L. Vaught, died eight years ago in Elizabethton, Tenn. Definite arrangements will not be made until some of the other children arrive. The body will be shipped to the old home in East Tennessee.

**Birds Killed Before Sunday.**  
Hunters returning from the Meacham country report having found evidence of hunters having been there the day before the grouse season opened. Three auto loads are reported to have been in the Parker Wells vicin-

ity all day Saturday and hunters going there yesterday report poor success. A number of hunting parties returned with the limit, some came back with a few birds and others were empty handed.

**Diver Joins in Search.**  
Jimmy Fulton, swimming and diving instructor at the public natatorium, was this afternoon taken by Coroner J. T. Brown to the scene of the drowning of Clyde Miller near Barnhart yesterday and will assist in trying to recover the body. The hole in which the body sank is about fifty feet long by fifty wide and ranges in depth from eight to twenty feet. The water is a little rocky.

**Deer Hunter Killed.**  
ALBANY, Ore., Aug. 14.—The first victim of the deer hunting season was Fred Larton, 16, killed by the accidental discharge of his own gun in the Alsea mountain district on Sunday.

SINNEMAHOING, Pa., Aug. 15.—Five men were killed and one injured when an explosion wrecked the gelatin department of the Astma explosive company.

**Italian Seriously Wounded.**  
PORTLAND, Aug. 15.—Two unidentified men stepped from the roadside on the outskirts of the city as Joseph Cereghino, an Italian, was driving by on his way to market, and shot him in the back, inflicting a serious wound. Cereghino suspects business rivals with whom he quarreled.

**Emperor Joseph Wants Peace.**  
ROME, Aug. 15.—Emperor Franz Joseph, of Austria, has written the pope applauding his efforts to bring about peace, adding: "I also pray God we may have an early peace." The pope has summoned Cardinal Gasparri, papal secretary of state, from his vacation. It was rumored the move was prompted by the new efforts of the pope toward peace.

**Wilson Extends Mercy.**  
WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—President Wilson commuted to expire the life sentence of James Brumfield, convicted in March, 1905, by the federal court in the then Indian territory, for the murder of his sister-in-law. Brumfield is 55 years old and would not be eligible for parole until 1926. His belief that he will not live until then and extenuating circumstances surrounding the murder led to a recommendation for clemency by the attorney general.

**Indispensable Man Dead.**  
BIRMINGHAM, Eng., Aug. 16.—Private Horace Gee, who became known throughout England as "the indispensable man" as the result of a debate in parliament, has been killed in action in the Dardanelles.

After he had enlisted, the Birmingham chamber of commerce petitioned parliament to release him from military service, on the ground that his services as an expert maker of needles were indispensable to the boot trade of central England. The matter was brought up in parliament and the government was compelled to defend its refusal to release Gee, saying that the shortage of needles had not so far affected the rate of production of army boots.

**Pasco Gets New Chief.**  
PASCO, Aug. 15.—W. H. Stevens resigned as chief of police of Pasco. As soon as the resignation was reported to Mayor Zent he appointed W. H. Leonard, a patrolman, to succeed Stevens. Mr. Stevens is entering the automobile business and will devote his entire time to it.

Mr. Stevens was first appointed by Mayor Johnson in 1914, and was reappointed by Mayor Zent in January, 1915. During the past few months he has waged a campaign to enforce the abatement act.
