# NEWS OF PENDLETON

### Got 14,000 Bushels.

Word has been received from Herbert Ruppe, farmer of this city that his 1915 crop from his farm in Alberta totaled 14,000 bushels. He writes that crops were generally good up there this year.

### Heralding the New Journal.

James Welch, former well known Pendleton young man, came up from Portland this morning to herald the morning-midnight edition of the Oregon Journal which will be published after Nov. 15. The first issue will reach Pendleton next Tuesday morning. Mr. Welch will remain in Umatilla county about ten days in the interests of the Portland paper.

### Will Take Final Testimony.

The final testimony in the famous Sturtevant will contest will be taken next week in Portland, according to local attorneys interested in the case. According to an agreement reached by the opposing attorneys, Dr. Fred Lianallen and three other Portland witnesses will give their testimony in the case in depositions taken down there. When these depositions are presented to Judge Marsh he will be ready to announce his decision in the case.

### Talks on Christianity.

The subject of the sermon at the Baptist church by Dr. Cairns last night was "The Supreme Argument for the Truth of Christianity." He said there are many lines of argument for the truth of a Christian's faith but the greatest of all is the witness of a Godly life. Recently they made a trip into the wilds of Montana after big game but met with ill luck, due to the inefficiency of their guide. A party of easterners

who went in just ahead of them under the direction of good guides got four elk and four grizzly bears four days after the season opened, according to Mr. Peret.

### Puts Up Sign Board.

Over the La Dow store, corner Main and Alta, a sign board, facing on both streets has been put up, and is being used by the Pastime theater in announcing its bill of pictures. The sign is lighted at night by electricity.

### Funeral Tomorrow P. M.

The funeral of Mrs. J. W. Kimbrell who died yesterday afternoon at 2:30 will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 at the Methodist church with Rev. C. A. Hodshire in charge. Interment will be made in Olney cemetery.

### Students Hold Big Rally.

Students of the high school held a big rally last evening to apprise the townspeople of the Pendleton-Baker game today. The rally was conducted by the girls, the first-time in history, and was successful from the lighting of the big bonfire to the serpentine that concluded it.

### No More Birds Until Spring.

Game Warden George Tonkin announces that the state game farm has refused the last few applications for Chinese pheasants from this county because of the approach of cold weather. No more birds will be sent out for liberation until milder weather sets in next spring, he announced.

### Divorce Is Granted.

In the circuit court this morning Judge G. W. Phelps granted a decree of divorce in the case of Thomas J. George vs. Amanda B. George which was only filed yesterday. The demurrer of the defendant was overruled by consent and the defendant refused to plead further.

### Judge Phelps Back.

Having finished the regular term of the Morrow county court in three days, Circuit Judge Phelps arrived home from Heppner last night. One of the cases tried was a murder case, State vs. P. J. Quinn who was accused of murdering John Connell at Castle Rock. After 18 hours the jury brought in a verdict of acquittal.

### Snow at Baker.

The Baker high school football players, here for the game today, bring word that Baker is covered with snow with prospects for more. They do not think the All-Star baseball game will be played there today because of the weather. However, the tickets sold for the baseball game will be good for a dance this evening at which the players will be guests.

### Near 1-4 Inch of Rain.

The rain which fell in Pendleton yesterday and last night measured 23 of an inch, according to official Observer Averill. This makes a total of .28 of an inch for the month so far. However, there is a big deficiency for the fall, owing to the dryness of October. Early this morning a light snow fell and the clouds have hung over the city all day but no rain has fallen.

### Want Administrator Appointed.

Petition has been filed with the county court asking for the appointment of Thomas Fitz Gerald as administrator of the estate of the late Leland Cross, whose body was shipped to Moscow yesterday. He was unmarried and left no relatives in this county. He left about \$100 in cash with Supt. McNary of the Eastern Oregon State Hospital and had some claims against the government for wages.

### Have Not Been Enjoined Yet.

Though the the Brunswick-Balke Colender Co. recently secured from the U. S. district court an injunction to prevent any district attorney or sheriff from attempting to enforce the so-called Sunday closing law, neither District Attorney Stelwer or Sheriff Taylor have yet been served with copies of the enjoining order. Practically all of the officers in the Willamette valley have been served.

### La Grippe Is Expensive, Now.

The many people who are now suffering from la grippe are finding that it costs considerable more now to have this disease than it did a year ago. Quinine, the staple remedy for la grippe, has jumped from 25 cents an ounce to over \$2.00 within the past year and people who have been in the habit of purchasing a dime's worth of this medicine are given a rude shock these days. The war and a short crop have combined to send the price sky high.

### Carried a Revolver.

When Peter Howard was arrested last night for being drunk, it was found that he carried a revolver in his pockets. He was booked on a charge of carrying concealed weapons and, upon pleading guilty this morning, was sentenced to pay a \$25 fine or spend 12 days in jail. He is still in jail. John Papan, a Greek, resisted Officer Smith when arrested last evening for being drunk and will stand trial on two charges this afternoon. Harry Braselle, a repeater, drew five days this morning on a drunk charge and there were several other plain drunks.
