MARINE CORPS SENIOR OUT.

High Honor Shows Sergeant-Major Deaver on Retirement.

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 15.—Sergeant-Major James Deaver, the highest ranking enlisted man in the United States Marine Corps, was retired with full military honors at the Puget Sound navy yard, having completed 36 years three months and one day of continuous service.

The honors accorded Sergeant-Major Deaver were those usually given only to a commissioned officer. The marine battalion was paraded and the commanding officer read the order retiring Sergeant-Major Deaver with pay "in recognition of 36 years of faithful and obedient service." He enlisted at Washington, D. C., in 1885. Before entering the Marine Corps he served five years in the army.

CABINET MEMBER WHO ATTACKS BRITISH POLICY IN SERBIA.



MARQUIS OF LANSDOWNE

Great Britain is stirred over the remarks of the Marquis of Lansdowne, who holds a seat in the cabinet with out portfolio, made at a meeting of the house of lords at which the Balkan situation was under discussion. Lord Lansdowne said that it was highly improbable that the Serbian army could withstand for any great length of time the attacks to which it is exposed from the Austro-German forces, and that the British had landed 15,000 men at Saloniki as a relief expedition to the Serbians. Lord Cromer also showed dissatisfaction at the manner in which the Balkan policy is being carried out.

SWAN ALLEGED TO HAVE BEEN KILLED BY PENDLETON MEN

REPORT IS MADE TO DEPUTY GAME WARDEN OF VIOLATION OF LAW.

Warden Tonkin and His Assistant Unearth Dead Swan Buried on the Reserve—H. K. Dean, Assistant Superintendent of Experiment Station, Leaves for Washington.

HELMSTON, Nov. 15.—Two Pendleton sportsmen are facing serious charges made by Deputy Game Warden Chas. Percy, for killing a swan last Sunday on the reserve of the Pendleton gun club, just a quarter of a mile northeast of town.

E. I. Davis, a local resident and witness, reported the shooting to Deputy Percy, who immediately notified County Warden Tonkin.

Investigation on the return of the hunters to Pendleton, were without results. Warden Tonkin and Deputy Percy yesterday in their search unearthed the swan, which had been shallowly buried on the reserve.

The date of the trial will be set for the near future and will doubtless be one of more than local interest.
