

BOLT WHICH TRAPPED FIRE VICTIMS

This picture shows the locked bolt and part of the charred trap door between the third and fourth floors of the Brooklyn factory building in which twelve lives were lost on Saturday. The screws, fastening the bolt can be plainly seen. Most of those who were burned to death were caught behind this trap door and were unable to open it. It was finally pried from its hinges, but too late to save most of those caught behind it. The door is being held as evidence in the investigation to fix the responsibility for the loss of life.

BETTER AIR FLEET WANTED.

Member of House of Commons Says Service Is Unsatisfactory.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—Resuming the debate in the house of commons, which was adjourned on account of the absence of members of the cabinet, William Joynt Hicks, member for the Brentford division of Middlesex, drew attention to the condition of the Royal Flying Corps and the naval air service. He said there was dissatisfaction connected with the naval air service in regard to organization and the appointment of a chief who knew nothing about aircraft above the heads of those who

in fact, had built up the fabric of the service. It was important, added the member, that Great Britain should have large, new aeroplanes for the offensive next spring in order to meet the new warships and new aeroplanes which the Germans were building. He asked why work on a British Zeppelin had been stopped in January, and whether the admiralty had dropped the policy of attacking Zeppelins by aeroplanes.

Wallace Irwin to Wed. LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 17.—Wallace Irwin, well known writer, will wed Miss Letitia McDonald here January 5.

PLANES FLY FROM SHIPS.

First Successful Start From Moving Vessel Is Recorded.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—Rear Admiral Benson, chief of operations, has returned to Washington after spending two days at the Pensacola station and witness the successful testing of a new launching device for aeroplanes installed on the cruiser North Carolina. Of this test, the department's summary says: "The first successful flight of an aeroplane from the deck of a ship while under way demonstrated the actual conditions of dispatching an aerial scout from a cruiser at sea in war. No one single event in the development of aeronautics in the navy has had such importance as this flight."

Lieutenant A. A. Cunningham, of the marine corps, has been appointed a naval aviator, being the 14th student to qualify.

Native Child Dies First.

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—Children under 5 years old who are born in the city of native parents die more numerous than children whose parents are foreigners, according to figures for 1914, made public by the health department.

The compilation shows that out of every 1000 children of native white parentage 44 boys and 35 girls do not reach the fifth year, whereas on the same basis, only 35 boys and 32 girls, offspring of foreigners, die in early childhood.

SHIVERICK.

Cornell has its Charlie Barret, star quarterback, and Bill Cool, the great center, but it also has another man who is entitled to fame on the football field. Shiverick, the left half-back has demonstrated his remarkable football ability on more than one occasion for the Cornell team this fall. When Barret was injured in the Harvard game, Shiverick was elected to do most of the punting and running for Cornell. He did it so well that Barret's loss was not felt. In the Michigan game, this slender lad also did some good kicking and running. He ranks with the best half-backs of the season and will be nominated by some of the experts for a place on the All-American eleven.

MONARCHY TO BE DELAYED.

Europe and Japan Are Asked to Quell Rebels in Sumatra.

BEKIN, Nov. 17.—Summoned to the Chinese foreign office the Russian, French and British ministers and the Japanese charge d'affaires, were assured by Lu Cheng Hsuan, the minister of foreign affairs, that China, after learning of the people's will concerning the change in the government from a republic to a monarchy, must find suitable time for the enthronement arrangements. Consequently some delay, he said, was necessary.

The foreign minister did not mention the probable date of the enthronement ceremony but gave the diplomats the impression that it would be further distant than January 5.

Lu Cheng Hsuan again masked the representatives of the powers to check the rebels operating in the foreign concessions which are beyond Chinese jurisdiction.

Gases Down Serbians.

GENEVA, Nov. 16.—The Teuton forces in Serbia are employing asphyxiating gases with considerable success, the Serbians not being equipped with masks.

Storm Smashes Windows.

SEASIDE, Ore., Nov. 17.—A storm which struck Seaside destroyed the plate glass windows in the Gilbert block, corner of Broadway and Seventh street.
