**CALIFORNIA MAY GET
BULLDOG OF THE NAVY**

**HISTORIC BATTLESHIP OREGON
MAY BE USED AS TRAIN-
ING SHIP.**

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 23.—Report comes from San Francisco that the historic battleship Oregon, which

made the spectacular run from San Francisco to Santiago and took part in the great naval battle off the Cuban coast in 1898, has been offered tentatively to the naval militia of California as a training ship.
This recalls the effort made last April and May by the Oregon Naval militia and interested civic organizations to have the Oregon brought to Portland for a training ship for the naval militia of this state.
The governor, the adjutant general, the Portland Chamber of Commerce and the Astoria Chamber of Commerce joined in the request for the "Bulldog of the Navy."
The request was denied by the secretary of the navy, Josephus Daniels, on the ground that the battleship could not go in and out of the harbor with safety during low water.
Accepting this as final the naval militia has since asked for a torpedo boat for a training ship. Both Adjutant General White and Captain Blair of the naval militia, said they thought a torpedo boat would be more serviceable here as it could be used to better advantage for cruising.
Captain Blair said it would be difficult to handle the Oregon with as small a naval militia organization as Oregon has.
Captain Blair said, however, he doubted if the Oregon would be assigned to California until a general reassignment of ships is made. He said a general plan is being worked out, and at the time California gets the Oregon he expects that this state will in all probability get its torpedo boat.

At Adjourned Meeting of the Council Jas. Ralph is Chosen to Fill the Place of Former Councilman R. C. Todd Who Resigned—Other Newsy Notes of Hermiston.

HERMISTON, Ore., Nov. 23.—At an adjourned meeting of the council Thursday evening J. Ralph was voted to fill the vacancy of former Councilman R. C. Todd, resigned.
Mr. Ralph has been an active worker in the commercial club and other progressive activities during his residence here the past several years but until now has never held a public office. His term will expire in December of next year.

Local politics for the coming election in December have so far aroused little interest among the voters.
C. M. Jensen's petition for city recorder is now the only one in the field though there are three councilmen and the treasurer to be elected.
F. A. Phelps the present treasurer is disqualified, having served two terms in that office. The councilmen whose terms expire next month are Chas. E. Baker, Thomas Fraser and J. W. Campbell.
Mr. Campbell was elected to the council about a year ago to fill the vacancy of Herbert J. Young, resigned.
