The blankets will be the best that can be made in the world and they will be given with the compliments of C. S. Jackson, former Pendletonian, and owner of the Portland Journal.

Mr. Jackson recently ordered the blankets through the Peoples Warehouse and gave instructions as to their shipment, etc. Among other things it will be stated the blankets are made of "free wool" and that no tariff will be needed to make the woolgrowers prosperous if the pure fabric law can be passed.

But the Woodrow Wilson family will not be the only people in high official life at Washington in possession of Pendleton blankets. Mr. Jackson recently ordered a pair of the local blankets sent to Mr. and Mrs. McAdoo and a pretty little woolen baby blanket to the baby daughter of the secretary of the treasury.

During the days he was in Pendleton, Mr. Jackson was one of the original workers in behalf of establishing the woolen mill here and he has always taken a great pride in the industry.
