bounded from the ground squarely into his arms and he raced unopposed over the goal line for a touchdown. Lodell missed goal.

The remainder of the first quarter and all of the second quarter saw no further chance of a score. No big yardage was made and both teams punted frequently. Once Siebert punt, so against the wind to Jefferson's 40 yard line and Callison recovered the ball when the safety fumbled it. Sie-

bert punted and Jefferson put the ball in play on her own 15 yard line. A penalty put them back half the distance to the goal but all danger was eliminated when Lodell punted 25 yards over Ulrich's head. Several forward passes were tried by both teams during the half but for the most part they were incomplete.

Early in the second half the Portland boys advanced the ball twice within Pendleton's ten yard line, once by a forward pass and once by a fake place kick that became a pass over the line but each time penalties put

them back 15 yards. A fumble for a loss of 25 yards removed the ball from the danger zone and gave it to the locals. Almost immediately, however, the visitors intercepted a forward pass and in three downs they negotiated the distance to the goal. Captain Sax went around right end for a 25 yard gain. Woffler plunged four through the line and Sax corked his way for 15 yards and a touchdown in an off-tackle play. Lodell kicked goal.

The third and last touchdown was garnered by the Portlanders in the final quarter through the aid of a 25 yard forward pass and an 18 yard run by Lodell that put the ball on Pendleton's three yard line. Bosch in two hucks carried it over and Lodell kicked goal.

A down of more forward passes were tried during the second period with Jefferson the gainer. Two others were good for substantial gains while Pendleton completed only one for an eight yard gain. The interference and tackling of the visitors was far superior to that of the Pendleton boys, they had the advantage of weight and their individual stars were of greater magnitude. The work of Captain Sax in advancing the ball was a pretty spectacle. He proved himself one of the best offensive

players seen here this year. Lodell and Woffler also started offensively while Wiley at guard showed his strength on the defense.

Casey was one of the Pendleton defensive stars, his work in breaking up the end runs being a noticeable feature. Mims, Badley, Fowler, Russell and Callison did some great blocking work at times and on a number of occasions broke through the line and stopped plays before they were started.

The line-ups were as announced yesterday, save that Bowman started both halves in Carr's place at half-back and figured in several good gains. Giebisch went in for Mender, son at left tackle for Portland early in the first quarter. Richard Devine refereed the contest, Elsie Kirkpatrick was umpire, George Haer head timekeeper and R. E. Chloupek time-keeper.

HIT BY AUTO, BODY HIDDEN.

Occupants of Car Drag Dead Man Out of Road and Conceal Him.

WEST BRIDGEWATER, Mass., Nov. 25.—After an automobile had struck and killed William McFadden, a farm hand, its occupants dragged his body 20 feet and tossed it into a stream. Then they attempted to hide the stains in the road by covering them with gravel. The police have found no trace of the automobile.

Calvin Pratt of Taunton, who was riding in his automobile an hour after the killing of McFadden, saw stains in the dust, and by following them came to the body in the stream. Frank N. Paradise saw a red automobile dart away after the man was killed, but did not know at the time the reason for the haste.

SOPHOMORE NOT 16 YET.

James Mulford Youngest student to Enter Indiana University.

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., Nov. 26.—James Mulford of Aurora is probably the youngest student ever to enter Indiana University. Mulford was born June 18, 1904, and entered the state university this fall, 15 years old. No older than many students when entering high school, Mulford will finish his first year and become a sophomore before he is 16 if he is successful in the university. He will be able to cite his name James Mulford, A. B., and possibly take a master's degree before he is 20.

BRITAIN MAY CURB LUXURY.

Laws Entering Domestic Economy Are Considered.

LONDON, Nov. 25.—That the government has under consideration the passage of summary laws to insure the strictest domestic economy, was the information given Charles Bathurst, Unionist member for Wiltshire, by Premier Asquith in the house of commons. The premier added that he would be glad to receive any suggestions concerning such legislation.

Mr. Bathurst had asked the premier whether, "in view of the serious state of the nation's finances and of the thoughtless extravagance and unnecessary luxury still being indulged in by many persons, the annoyance of their neighbors, the premier would consider the advisability of passing drastic summary laws, which would insure the strictest domestic economy and put all classes on a footing, during the war, of greater equality in their mode of living."
