FRENCH LAUNCH CAPTURED. Calypso in Custody of American Cruiser at La Paz. SAN DIEGO, Cal., Jan. 4.—The launch Calypso, which sailed from San Pedro December 27, the crew of which is sought by the Deputy United States Marshal at Los Angeles is in the custody of the cruiser New Orleans at La Paz, Lower California, according to radiogram received here from Admiral Winslow.

The Calypso was held at San Pedro under an admiralty libel instituted by the Standard Oil company and the San Pedro Iron Works, when it is alleged, the crew forcibly took possession from the Deputy United States Marshal and put to sea.

STATE WORTH \$1,600,000. Washington Has \$3,600,000 Cash and \$13,000,000 to Start Year. OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 4.—The state of Washington starts the year 1916 with total cash balances of \$7,603,423.82 in its various funds and bond holdings in excess of \$11,000,000.

The state general fund has a cash balance of \$1,204,975.35. The land statement shows bonds valued at \$11,762,393.80 in the permanent educational funds with \$369,000 in cash awaiting investments while \$1,226,400 of the accident fund also is invested in bonds.

WAR DRAWS AMERICANS. Border Enlistments Show Many Are From United States. PORTLAND, N. D., Jan. 4.—Canada's vigorous recruiting campaign is drawing many men from the United States. At a recruiting rally in North Portal, S. D., 17 young men offered to enlist of this number more than half are Americans.

Bryan Favors Alliance. WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—William Jennings Bryan, former secretary of state, went on record here as favoring a defensive alliance between the republics of North and South America in addressing the educational section of the Pan-American scientific conference.

Total of \$1,500,000 Stolen in Year—\$300,000 Above Preceding Year. CHICAGO, Jan. 4.—One million five hundred thousand dollars was stolen in Chicago during 1915, according to figures compiled from police records.
